DARTMOUTH.—Some parties were burning the brush off some land in the vicinity of Dartmouth, on Thursday night. The fire got beyond the control of those in charge and threatened mischief to the neighborhood. The flames were eventually subdued.

An effort at prosecution for illegal selling of liquor failed on Monday last, in consequence of neglect on the part of the authorities to have the By-laws signed by the Lieutenant Governor.

ASYLUM FOR THE INSANE.—On Wednesday last one of the inmates of the Insane Asylum set fire to his bedding. The timely discovery of the fire saved the patient's life, and probably prevented considerable damage to the building.

A few days since one of the inmates named Dann escaped and was captured in Water Street by a policeman and taken back. He has since escaped again and had not been found when we last heard.

SEVERE COURT.—Judges McCully and McDonald, passed sentence on Monday, on the criminals recently tried: John Kieley, for manslaughter—Penitentiary for four years.

Beals, a colored boy, for larceny—two years in the Penitentiary.

Sloane, for bigamy—six months in the County Jail.

THE WEATHER.—The long continued spell of dry weather up to the end of last week made serious inroads into the quantity of hay in the possession of farmers, especially those around Halifax. The price of hay rose to \$30 and \$30 per ton. On Saturday a farmer brought some to market and was offered \$30, but held it expecting to get \$40. A supply has since come in from P. E. Island.

On Saturday night a bountiful shower of rain fell for two or three hours bringing joy and gladness over all the face of nature. Every day since has witnessed the bursting forth of forest, field and garden into verdure and beauty. Man and beast may rejoice in the providential change. A finer season for getting crops into the ground could not have been. There is still reason to hope for an early spring.

THE CITADEL is having the earth covering taken from the Barrack buildings because of the dampness caused thereby.

The Maritime Catholic has had but a short life. The sea of public journalism is not adapted to the inflexible church.

ELLERSHOUSE.—Extensive preparations are being made here for the erection of paper mills. Mr. Ellershausen is bringing out two or three hundred German girls to work in them.

H. G. PINCO, Esq., M. P. P. for Cumberland, died at his residence in Pugwash on Tuesday the 19th inst., in the 46th year of his age. He was a son of the Hon. H. G. Pingo, and has represented Cumberland County in the Local Legislature since 1867. The following brief but just estimate of Mr. P. is from the Chronicle:—"His course in public life was moderate, consistent and honorable, and, with his many estimable personal qualities made for him a host of friends, without, we believe, a single enemy." We tender our deep sympathy to the bereaved parents and family under this sad affliction.

TRURO intends to build a new school house, and the rate-payers have resolved to assess themselves for \$10,000; the amount to be raised in five yearly instalments.

ANTIGONISH.—A boy aged 11, son of John Carroll, of this place, fell from a cart and a wheel passing over him, caused almost instant death.

PICTOU.—St. Andrew's Church congregation are about having an organ introduced into their Church.

The New Glasgow Chronicle draws attention to the fact that some of the recently arrived French immigrants at Vale Colliery, go out shooting, sometimes on Sabbath Day, and have been making quite free with partridges lately.

CHEYKRIE.—Capt. George Armstrong and Capt. H. H. Green, of Kempt, and Mr. Edward Dimock, of Windsor, have recently made large purchases of the Cheyrie estate, in Kempt, and intend establishing ship yards and a saw mill there.
