said that for many years he had been longing to undertake the work which had today been begun, without seeing any hope of its accomplishment. In dealing with the boys, cases came before him every day suggesting that the girls had claims equally urgent. All would immediately understand that if the little boys who were seen now and again upon our street were unthem, the girls were still less so, and the evils in their case were intensified.

It was pleasant to see the movement thus happily inaugurated, and it would be a brighter day still when the entire plan was carried out. The little girls had found friends; a father and a mother, so to speak, had been raised up to supply the place of those who had gone. It would perhaps be interesting to some if he entered a little more into detail, and mentioned the steps by which the institution had advanced to its present stage. A friend who was present, who did not desire his name to be known, but who never could be forgotten while his name was so deeply graven upon their hearts-this friend had much kindly sympathy with them in their work. When the facts were brought before him of their desire to get a house for girls, he at once set to work to get one. He saw no difficulties except the one of getting the right place in which to carry on the work. Eventually, the house which the visitors had seen as they came up the road, and the ground where they now were, were placed at their disposal by his kind and generous benefactor. That good friend has not merely done this, but has continued to take a warm, personal, and active interest in the work, believing no part of it unworthy of his attention. (Cheers) This kindness on his part was valued as much as the greater gift of the place itself. It should be borne in mind that the place was leasehold, rent free for a term of years. They were desirous of perpetuating the Home for sixty girls ; but a little experience had taught them that this was not the wisest plan. They went around to various institutions and observed that what was lacking was the element of the family circle, in which a mother's love was the mainspring. It was felt that no teachers could supply the place of that training which is to be received from a mother's influence. They felt that they were rescuing girls from evil ; but they also wished to give them the very best training possible for their future lives.

been to be present to-day, and to let all know that they wanted a cottage for Scotch lassies, and that this cottage they must have. In conclusion, he said that eleven stones would be laid, one of them being that of a chapel; the fact was they had no place of worship for the children, The village church could not contain the children of ten homes, and when thirty were erected fitted to do battle with the evils around what could they do? It seemed appropriate that they should build a chapel in which service would be conducted by clergymen and ministers of all churches, and the truths of the Gospel faithfully be taught. It will hold 800 persons, room being secured for 600 children. Vistors present might ob serve that there were thirty poles with little flags upon them, and he might say that each pole stood upon the site of a cottage which it was hoped would by-and bye stand

there. At the close of Dr. Barnardo's speech which was cheered again by the large company, Mr. H. Varley alluded to the great pleasure it afforded him to be present on the occasion, and to express his cordial sympathy with the great work in which Dr. Barnado was engaged. He was thankful to God for him and his work, and for every manifestation of energy that there was in him. Having read verses from Psalm xlix. and having commented upon them, Mr. Varley concluded by saying that it was only a question of time, and the work in which they were engaged should redound greatly to the glory of God. Mr. Sankey next greatly added to the enjoyment of the guests by singing in his most effective style, " Rescue the perishing," He prefaced the sacred song by saying, " I am happy to be with you to day. I have had the privilege of abiding seven weeks with Dr. Barnardo, and have seen a great deal of the work in which he is engaged. I wish to say that it is the utmost desire of my heart that the work in which he takes such an interest should be forwarded, and that it never shall be said he failed through want of money. There is plenty of money in the hands of God's stewards, and I think he is going to get it."




