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

POOR MAN'S FILTER .- It consists of a common garden flower pot, of some depth. The drainage hole is stopped, not too tightly, with a piece of clean sponge. A layer of about two inches of charcoal is first placed in the pot, then a second layer of clear sand, upon which a layer of three inches of clean, coarse gravel is placed. The pot can be set over an earthern jar, into which an abundant supply of pure water will filter for all drinking purposes.

A NEW BRIDGE is soon to be constructed over the Frith of Forth, Scotland, which will be the largest in the world. The height will be 150 feet and the number of spans nearly 100. The great central span is to be 1,500 feet, or nearly one 'third of a mile in width, and the smaller spans 160. Its estimated cost will be about \$10,000,-000.

PRESERVING CAST IRON FROM RUST. -Girders, angle irons, and other similar large masses of iron, are often placed in exposed situations, where damp air, steam, and acid vapors have access. If the iron be put up in the rough, it very speedily rusts, and, under favoraable conditions, the corrosion soon reaches a dangerous point. Contractors generally agree to supply such irons painted in three coats of minium, which. if honestly done, would, to a certain extent, protect the metal; but, as a rule, only one thin coat is applied, and the slightest abrasion exposes the iron. A new and peculiar mode of treating iron is the following: The metal is

dinary pencils, that can be filled into als call "thumb-pots"-that a dozen holders. The writing at first very plants costing, say \$2, will be sufficient &c. much resembles lead pencil marks, to enliven the smallest yard the whole summer long. They need not be destroyed during winter, if the owner will take the trouble to carefully lift them, set the roots in light mellow soil in a box, and place them near the window

in a light, dry, and airy cellar. Water occasionally through the winter, but only when absolutely necessary, as nine inches diameter and ten inches dormant plants need but little. It is useless to speak of the value of the tea rose during summer, as it stands at the head of the list of flowers. Blooming profusely, exceedingly fragrant, beautiful in colour, and of rapid growth, it seems to combine all the desirable. qualities of our best bedding plants .---New York Tribune.

> CHIMNEY SOOT is said to be a valaable stimulant and fertiltzer for garden flowers. A lady who had tried in vain to train a climbing rose and grape-vines over the windows was despairing over the stunted plants, when some one recommended "soot tea." Forthwith she made some "tea," taking a tea-cupful of soot to a quart of water. Two or three doses administered to both rose and vine effectually revived them. They grew rapidly and luxuriantly.

BROOM CORN FOR CATTLE .- W. H. Briggs of Syracus, Mo., writes as follows to the Prairie Farmer regarding a recent inquiry as to the best effect of broom-corn when fed to cattle: When my broom-corn stands up well I frequently pasture it before cutting as the stock only strip off the blades; and during reaping season all stock except milch cows and horses have free access to the seed. I don't think it agrees well with horses, and too much of the greem seed will, I think, reduce the yield of milk in cows but further than that, I don't think it has any bad effect, as I think I should have found Margaree, C.
