

OTTAWA, 3rd May 1875. FISHERY LAWS AND REGULATIONS FOR NOVA SCOTIA.

The attention of all persons concerned is requested to the recent repeal of the Revised Statutes of Nova Scotia relating to River Fisheries, and to the operation in lieu thereof of the Dominion Fisheries Act and Amending Act, and the revised Fishery Regulations adopted under the same. Copies of the Fisheries Act and amending Act, also copies of the Fishery Regulations as published in the Canada Gazette, will he supplied to the Inspector of Fisheries, at Halifax, N. S., to the Assistant Inspector at Amherst, N. S., and to Fishery Officers of respective Counties in Nova Scotia, for public information.
