

pared to take the responsibility of interfering with Turkish affairs, as suggested by Russia.

The "Pall Mall Gazette" is authorized to say that the Admiralty's fugitive slave circular will be withdrawn and new instructions issued.

The ironclad "Magenta" is a total wreck. The explosion which followed set fire to the "Victoriense," and "Eclaire," but the flames were soon extinguished. A few persons were wounded by the explosion.

The "Serapis" arrived at Bombay with the Prince of Wales on Sunday last. Preparations on shore for his reception were immense.

FRANCE.—The French Assembly met at Versailles on Thursday. A motion for the early consideration of M. Buffet's Electoral bill was made.

Duke D'Audiffret Pasquier is chosen President of the Assembly by a combination of the Left with a portion of the Right. This is regarded as a demonstration against the Bonapartists.

Boulogne harbor has been closed by the sinking of a steamer at its entrance.

TURKEY.—A telegram from Vienna states that 36,000 Servian militia are assembling at the frontier. The Servian Government has sent agents to Paris and London to raise a loan.

GERMANY.—Prussia has asked Austria to prevent Bishop Forrester, while residing in the Austrian portion of his diocese, from exercising any episcopal function touching the Prussian portion.

The Post's special telegram states that the Arsenal at Rendsburg, in Holstein, was almost destroyed by fire on Wednesday. Forty thousand rifles were destroyed. The total damage is estimated to be five million marks.

Captain Boynton is to swim to Cologne from Basle, making a short halt at Strasburg.

A telegram from Berlin states that a Central Government for Alsace-Lorraine will be established at Berlin, and there will probably be a special ministry.

SPAIN.—Minister Cushing has presented a second note to the Spanish Government relative to the jurisdiction of courts martial over citizens of the United States residing in Cuba.

One thousand more soldiers are to be sent to Cuba by the Spanish authorities.

Saballs, having returned from Spain, was arrested by the Carlists. He and Dorregay will be court-martialed for the late disasters to Carlists in Catalonia.

The "Cronista," the Ministerial organ, believes American filibusters invented the news of the equipment of five frigates for Cuba, to create complications.

The last of the Carlists in Catalonia, numbering 680, including six commanders, have asked for amnesty.

Russia.—The Russian Government has begun a fresh movement against the Socialist agitators. Numerous arrests have been made.

Famine is threatened in Russia in consequence of the unparalleled failure of this year's harvest.

It is announced, semi-officially, that Russia has sent no communication to the Signatories of the Treaty of Paris regarding Turkish affairs.

The failure of Dr. Strousberg, the great railway contractor, severely threatens Russia's commercial credit.

Russia is disinclined to act independently as a mediator in the Herzegovinian troubles. The insurgents are receiving arms from Montenegro.

AFRICA.—A bloody warfare is going on between the Liberians and other Africans.

INDIA.—A British resident was murdered in Malaya, and Tempy's troops have gone there to punish the guilty parties.
