The Paris Monitor says there is no longer any doubt that England has an eye upon Egypt. Le Temps declares that the purchase of the 177,000 shares in the Suez Canal Stock (for four million pounds) gives England a suzerainty in Egypt.

At a meeting in London of bondholders and others interested in Liberia, on Friday, it was resolved that a deputation should wait upon American Minister Schenck and the English Foreign Minister, the Earl of Derby, with a view of obtaining aid in protecting the Republic in the present crisis.

The purchase of shares of Suez canal stock company by the Government is approved by the English press. The "Daily News" says it is intended that some person possessing the confidence of the Government shall proceed to Egypt to examine into the finances of that country.

FRANCE.—The Electoral Bill was under discussion in the Assembly the whole of last week. On Friday it became violent M Buffet announced that the Government policy would be "The exclusion of the Radicals, and the union of all Conservative forces in the cause of social preservation."

A B-napartist meeting at Belleville, near Paris, on Tuesday, was attended by three thousand people, and addressed by Paul D. Cassagac.

The French steamer "Amerique" broke her shaft at sea and proceeded under sail for Havre.

The steamer "China" took her passengers and mails and landed them at Queenstown.

SPAIN.—Private accounts from Madrid state that the Constitutional party is divided. Some advocate abstaining from the approaching elections.

General Martinez Campos is at Madrid consulting with the Cabinet in regard to the war.

A number of republicans have been arrested at Madrid, and others have fled.

Italy.—The Italian government will insist on a money payment for the losses of the Italian residents at San Salvador.

The Italian Minister of Commerce and the Philadelphia Exhibition Committee have signed a convention to assure the representation of Italy at the Centennial.

TURKEY.—It is reported that the Turkish in-urgents captured an important fort with the garrison which commanded Zibce, and occupied several stronger positions near Piva.

The negotiations between Austria and Russia respecting the reforms for Turkey have failed.

A special from Berlin says intelligence has been received from Herzegovina that the Turkish forts at Golansko and Nicksio must shortly capitulate to the insurgents unless provisioned in time.

A telegram from Constantinople states that the Porte has urged the Russian and Austrian ambassadors to remonstrate with the Prince of Montenegro, as so many of his subjects are joining the insurgents.
