The Atlantic Cable charges have been reduced to fifty cents per word.

JOURNALISM.—The "Evening Express" has been discontinued. The "Citizen" has changed from a tri-weekly morning paper to a daily evening paper.

AN AGED CITIZEN GONE.—Mr. John Parker who for many years was one of the most prominent victuallers of the city, and more recently one of the city flour-weighers, died on Wednesday last, at the advanced age of 92 years.

THE SUMMER ARRANGEMENTS on the Railways commence this week. The night train between Halifax and St. John has been resumed, leaving Richmond Depot at 5.15 P. M.

A HARBOR EXCURSION BOAT.—The stock has been taken for the purchase of a new boat for this purpose. \$4000 in 80 shares of \$50 each. A suitable steamer is to be purchased at Portland for \$3000. It will doubtless be a successful speculation.

ALDERMAN C. C. VAUX was elected to the Secretaryship of the City School Board. There were twenty-four applicants for the office, one of whom was a lady.

OXLEY'S WHARF was sold at Auction last week for the sum of \$42,000, and the shops at the head of it for \$6,100.

POINT PLEASANT PARK.—At a meeting of the City Council on Tuesday last a letter was read from Sir William Young suggesting the opening of an entrance from Park street to the Point Pleasant Park, and offering to contribute \$2000 for that purpose. The whole cost would be between \$5000 and \$6000. The consideration of the matter was deferred till next meeting.

THREE POLICEMEN were required last week to fill vacancies in our city force. There were thirty-five applicants for the offices.

Y. M. C. A.—At the Quarterly meeting last week J. S. McLean, Esq., J. B. Morrow, Esq., and Rev. A. W. Nicholson, were elected representatives to attend the International Convention, to be held at Richmond, Va.

WRECKED.—The steamer Alhambra went ashore at Cape Sable on Sunday afternoon at 5 o'clock during thick weather. Fifty-two passengers and crew all saved. The cargo will be saved in a damaged condition. The ship will probably be a total loss. She has been running between Halifax, Boston, and P. E. Island for the past seven or eight years.

The steamer "NOVA SCOTIAN" for England, will not leave until Friday, at noon. Owing to the steamer "Polynesian" and other ships of the Allan line, not being able to reach Quebec on account of the ice blockade, the "Nova Scotian" will have to go to Portland to take the Canadian mails of Saturday for England.

DARTMOUTH.—The Annual Town meeting was held on Tuesday afternoon and evening. A large number of ratepayers were present. The Warden's report, and the estimates for the ensuing year, amounting to \$18,000 were submitted and discussed. The estimates were approved of, and an additional expenditure of \$25,000 for bringing the water into the town, was authorized by a vote of 77 to 16. The following resolution respecting the Ferry question, which was discussed during the evening session, was adopted by a very large majority:—

Resolved, That we, the undersigned, authorize the Warden and Council to act upon the report of the Steam Ferry Committee presented to the meeting, and to take such steps as may seem best to accomplish the plan therein developed, and obtain the passage of such Acts of the Legislature as will render legal the carrying out of the scheme.

The object of this action was to make the Ferry a part of the Corporation arrangements.
