

THE CITY HALL AFFAIR.—The suit commenced by Mr. J. R. Jennett, in the Equity Court, to compel the City of Halifax to complete the purchase of its property, which was held on as the site of the proposed City Hall was concluded on Monday, Judge Ritchie decided against Mr. Jennett.

ICELANDIC IMMIGRANTS.—A party of Icelandic immigrants numbering 38 persons, men, women and children, who have been in Ontario for some time, arrived here in the steamer "Chase" from Portland on Monday. They intend settling at Musquodoboit. Their appearance shows them to be healthy and hardy. It is reported that a large number are coming to settle at the same place.

It is stated that Mr. A. G. Jones is to be appointed Lieutenant Governor of Nova Scotia, and that Mr. Archibald will be raised to the bench.

Nearly 100 sail of vessels, most of them American have been at Prospect and Dover, waiting for bait.

TREASURES OF THE DEEP.—William Christian of Prospect, recently obtained a diving suit, and went down into the wreck of the brig "Spanish Main," lost with all on board, 53 years ago, off Moagher's Head, Prospect.—His labor was rewarded by finding quite a number of Spanish golden doubloons valued at \$16 each. He intends to prosecute the search for more during the summer.

LIVERPOOL.—A serious fire occurred here on Wednesday last. It broke out in the house occupied by Andrew McNutt, under which was the store of Messrs. D. & A. McNutt. It also consumed the adjoining ones occupied by A. Kenny as a shoe factory; J. L. Hammon, Druggist; H. B. Hallett, Tailor, and A. D. Hammett, Daguerrean Artist. The loss will be heavy, although the buildings and stocks were partially insured. Unfortunately several of the parties had expended new goods the day before to a considerable amount.

SAD COINCIDENCE.—Some time ago there died at Mahon, C.B., a Mrs. Wm. Murray, after a very brief illness, and now intelligence has been received that her sister, Mrs. Ellis, was on the same day burned to death in a field near her residence at Melbourne, Australia. The flames spread to her clothes, and she was so badly burned before the fire could be extinguished that she died. The deceased ladies were daughters of Mr. Robert Pollock of Lower Stewiacke.—Express.

SYDNEY, C. B.—A young girl, daughter of Mr. Wm. McDonald, shoemaker, had been engaged to be married, but a protracted illness prevented the performance of the rite. On Sunday evening, the young man to whom she was engaged, procured the services of a clergyman, and the pair were united. At nine o'clock the bride was a corpse.

TELEGRAPHIC.—R. T. Clinch, Esq., Supt. of the Western Union Telegraph Company, is now in Cape Breton, taking delivery of the telegraphic lines on that island, which are being transferred to the control of the Western Union Company. They have been, heretofore, we believe, under the control of the Cable Company—the Anglo-American. This adds a very large district to that already under Mr. Clinch's control, and the effect of it we suppose will be to make the uniform rate apply all over Nova Scotia, (heretofore Cape Breton has had its own tariff,) so that the figure for messages will be 25 instead of 50 cents.—St. John Globe.
