THE PEESBYTEBIAN SYNOD OF THE LOWER PROVINCES Was in session at St. John last week. It was commenced on Tuesday evening by a sermon from Rev. Robert Sedgwick, the Moderator, who was subsequently re-elected.

Rev. J. R. Kean, Congregationalist minister applied for admission to the body. We gather from the report in the Witness a few items of interest : Rev. P. G. McGregor gave a brief outline of the state of Home Missions.

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Dr. Burns presented the statement of the Theological Hall, shewing that the obligations of the Church amount to \$9000. The Colonial Committee of the Church of Scotland contribute the sum of £300, for Professor Pollok's salary. It was stated that there is special need for more students. The salary of Professor McDonald in Dalhousie College was raised to \$1500. Judge Stevens urged that the existence of the Hall was need-Dr. McCulloch said the hisless. tory of the church is the best answer to Judge Stevens' speech. It has been blessed of God from the beginning and is blessed of God to this day. The Hall is a necessity, and if it dies we die; it is essential to our existence. Dr. Maclise moved the appointment of a Committee to consider the consolidation of the Hall with that at Montreal. He thought there were too many Colleges and Seminaries. Dr. McCulloch spoke very strongly against Dr. Maclise's resolution and moved in amendment, " That the Hall is a necessity in the existing circumstances of the Church." Rev. A. McL. Sinclair considered that theoretically Judge Stevens was right. It would be better if we had only two or say three Halls in the Dominion. We live in a time when strong institutions with many Professors are required. But the theory cannot be carried out. Rev. G. M. Grant said the question is not that we have too many Colleges; we have too many, but the Halitax one is essential. No one in all Canada ever dreamed of proposing that there should not be a College at Halifax. If they could amalgamate in the Upper Provinces they would, but they could not. The College must be made permanent by an endowment. If our young men go abroad we get only one third of them back again. Rev. Thomas Duncan felt that the College was necessary to the prosperity of the church. To raise \$2500 this year we want an average collection of \$15 from all our congregations.
