PUBLIC NOTICE.

THE ACT passed in the last Session of Parliament to amend and consolidate the Statute Law for the regulation of the Postal Service of the Dominion, comes into operation on the 1st of October, 1875.

On and after that date the Rates of Postage on a letter posted within the Dominion of Canada, for transmission by Mail to any place in Canada, will continue to be 3 cents per half-ounce weight, but the rate must be prepaid by POSTAGE STAMP at the time of posting the letter.

On letters posted at this office to be delivered in the city commonly known as "Drop Letters," the rate will be One Cent per half ounce, to be in all cases prepaid by Postage Stamp.

NEWSPAPERS AND PERIODICALS.

Newspapers and Periodicals, printed and published in Canada, and issued not less frequently than once a month from a known office of Publication or News Agency, and addressed and posted by and from the same for transmission by mail to regular subscribers or News Agents in Canada, may be posted by the same on prepayment of a rate of One Cent for each pound weight in bulk or fraction of a pound; and such newspapers and periodicals are to be put up into packages and delivered into the Post Office and the postage rate thereon prepaid by the Publisher or News Agent, being the sender thereof, under such regulations as the Postmaster General may from time to time make.

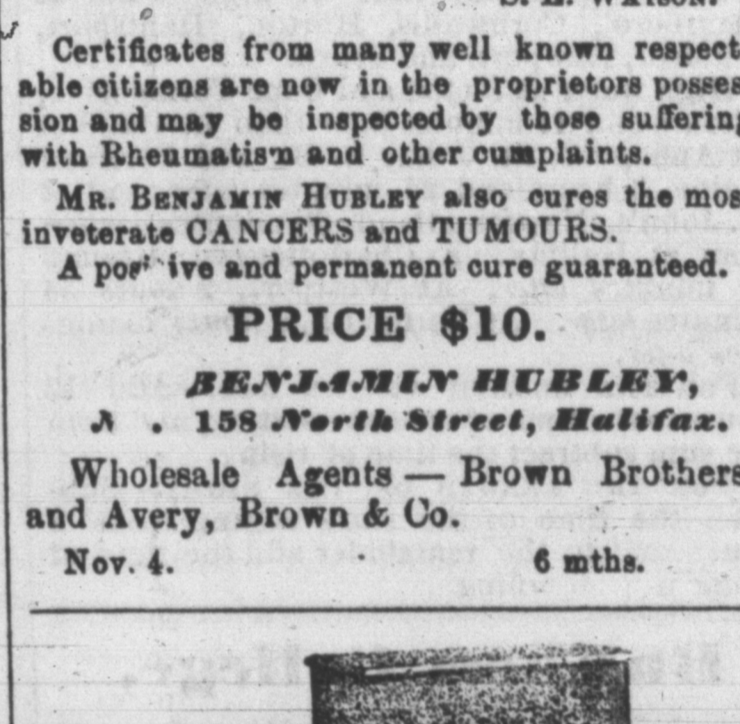
