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Nova Scotia. Two new churches have been constituted: at Annapolis Royal and Pleasantville, both in Nova Scotia.

New Meeting Houses have been opened at Annapolis Royal; Kentville; Osborne, Shelburne Co; Morristown Mahone Bay; and New Canaan, in Nova Scotia; -and at Hillsborough; Pleasant River, Queens Co.; and Fairfield, St. Martins, in New Brunswick. Others are in progress.

The Committee have noticed with great interest the movements in Great Britain and Ireland, and in various parts of the Continent of Europe, on behalf of religious revival. Without pledging themselves to an approval of every method employed by evangelists, they cannot, nevertheless fail to rejoice in the attention excited to the truths of the gospel, and the deep convictions produced in favour of an advanced state of personal piety. They believe that "the higher Christian life," as it is now called, is the natural and necessary devolopment of Christian character, resulting from " faith in the Lord Jesus and love unto all the saints"; and that what is viewed in the distance as an object of admiration, supposed to be capable of being possessed and realised by only a select few, is in fact the common privilege of the family. That very many are satisfied with a lower position, is too true; but it is certain that completeness of Christian character is attainable by every believer, and should be secured by all. And it will be, when holy meditation shall be the habitual exercise of Christian minds, and prayer shall be distinguished by the faith and fervour which are due to the claims of the unchangeable God, and individual effort for conversion and edification shall form the every-day history of the followers of the Saviour.

An approximation to such a state of Rev. W. P. Everett, Otnabog things is surely to be looked for even now; and especially it may be hoped that there will be large accessions to the body of Christian labourers, men "full of faith and of the Holy Ghost" entering into the field, anxious to be employed in gathering in the harvest. And in recognising the gifts and graces by which men are qualified for the work of God, it is fair to expect that peculiar regard will be had to earnest personal devotedness to Christ, and the acquisition of such culture as the times demand to be sanctified to noblest ends. The Lord Jesus calls for the employment of the best men, the most extensive attainments, and the amplest resources.

The Committee renew the recommendation to appoint a day for special humiliation, thanksgiving, and prayer. J. M. CRAMP, Chairman.

It was agreed that the first Thursday in December be recommended to the Churches, to be observed as a Day of Special Humiliation, Thanksgiving and Prayer.

The Home Secretary's Report on Foreign Missions details the pro-Session of Convention at Amherst and the subsequent proceedings of the Board, and reports the total amount of contributions paid into the Mission Treasury to be \$6188. The balance in hand deposited to the credit of the Board being \$9855 49 Besides which amount there is a reserve fund of £400 sterling which is now probably on deposit in the Bank of Bengal, Rangoon, to be used only in case of emergency.
