

were carried away and hundreds of cattle were drowned.

At Port Deposit, Indiana, the water was from 5 to 15 feet deep in the streets, and nearly the whole town was flooded, causing very great destruction of property.

A bridge over the Susquehanna, at Pittston, was swept away by a flood 10 minutes after the train had passed.

Three men were killed and several wounded five miles from Cleveland, Ohio, by a powder mill explosion, and \$30,000 of damage done in Cleveland by the concussion.

A tornado in the Western part of Georgia, on Saturday, caused the death and wounding of 59 persons, with heavy loss of property.

A terrific wind swept over the region of Raleigh, N. C., on Saturday. Several persons were killed, others injured. Many houses were blown down and trees over a large area were torn up by the roots.

The Irishmen of New York will unite in funeral procession at an early day in memory of John Mitchell.

MEXICO.—An earthquake on February 11th, shook a large part of Northern Mexico. The little town of Christoval was nearly destroyed, and seventy dead bodies have been taken from the ruins.

BRAZIL.—The extraordinary session of the Brazilian Legislative Assembly called for the purpose of considering the Budget and the disorder prevalent in the country, was concluded on Wednesday. The speech from the Throne was delivered by the Emperor in person.

LATEST FROM EUROPE.

ENGLAND.—John Mitchell died at Newry on Saturday last. He has been the source of much difficulty, as one of the leading agitators in Ireland.

It is understood that the Prince of Wales will visit India during the coming cool season.

The attendance at Moody and Sankey's revival meetings continue as large as ever, although the ticket system is adopted expressly to prevent over crowding.

The Irishmen in London held a mass meeting in Hyde Park on Sunday last. 30,000 were present. Resolutions were adopted demanding the release of the Fenian prisoners, condemning the Coercion Laws in Ireland, and condoling with the family of John Mitchell.

FRANCE.—The French Assembly has elected the Duke d'Audiffret-Pasquier, President of that body,—he received 318 out of 598 votes.

When the Assembly met on Tuesday, the Duke d'Audiffret Pasquier took the chair. He read an address containing strangely worded expressions against the Bonapartists, which were loudly cheered by the Left.

The Paris "L'Univers" publishes the address of General Cabrera issued to the Carlists, Cabrera announces his recognition of Alfonso as King of Spain.

The Ministers stated at a meeting of the Bureau on Saturday, that the question of dissolution was subject solely to the decision of the Assembly, but that it would be dangerous to the foreign and domestic relations to fix the date long before the event. Several officers suspected of favoring Alfonso have been arrested at Estella.

SPAIN.—Spain has demanded the extradition from German Territory of Don Alfonso, brother of Don Carlos, charging him with offences against the common law. He has arrived in Munich en route to Styria. The Government has requested Austria not to permit Don Alfonso to reside in Austrian territory.

Nine battalions of Carlists made a night attack upon the town of Gudagury, but were repulsed after a two hours fight. The Carlists lost 200 men in the attack.

It is rumored that General Elia has abandoned Don Carlos' cause.

General Compaas has defeated the Carlists before Olus and entered the town. 900 Carlists were made prisoners. Castellar has resigned the Professorship in the University, in consequence of the government re-establishing in schools and colleges the exclusive use of text books and prospectuses prescribed during Queen Isabella's reign, and otherwise changing the manner of public instruction.

GERMANY.—A special from Berlin to the London Times says that in the recent despatch to the German Minister at Rome, Bismarck suggests that all the states with a certain number of Catholic inhabitants, enter into an agreement to repel the Papal interferences with their politics.

Bismarck made a speech on Tuesday in support of the new Ecclesiastical Bill. He said the maxim that more obedience was due to God than man, certainly did not mean that more obedience was due a Pope, misguided by Jesuits, than to the King. The Government was doing its duty in protecting German freedom of mind against Rome.

In the Landtag on Wednesday, the main clauses of the Bill withstanding State Grants from Roman Catholic bishops were passed by overwhelming majorities.

The Archbishop of Cologne, on behalf of the whole Roman Catholic Episcopate of Prussia, sent a petition to the Lower House, urging it not to pass that part of the ecclesiastical bill giving the people a share in the administration of local church property.

All the clauses of the Ecclesiastical Bill were adopted and the Bill passed its second reading on Saturday.

ITALY.—It is said that confidential exchanges of views are taking place between Germany and Italy in regard to the election of a Pope.

BERMAH.—Difficulty has arisen between the Indian Government and the King of Burmah regarding the boundaries, and the latter's claim to sovereignty over several independent states. In spite of Lord Northbrook's proposals for a mixed commission for the settlement of the question at issue, the King has occupied the disputed territory, and is sending 4000 troops to the Arakan frontier. The British authorities insist on the settlement by commission, and troops are going to British Burmah.

CHINA.—Information has been received that the British Surveying Expedition in Western China were attacked by Chinese officials. The latter were defeated in the fight which ensued and twenty of them killed.

Fiji.—At the Fiji Islands the measles have broken out among the natives, resulting in many deaths.
