





GERMANY .- A special from Berlin to the London Times says that in the recent despatch to the German' Minister at Rome. Bismark suggests that all the states with a certain number of Catholic inhabitante, enter into an agreement to repel the Papal interferences with their politics.

Bismarck made a speech on Tuesday in support of the new Ecclesiastical Bill. He said the maxim that more obedience was due to God than man, certainly did not mean that more obedience was due a Pope, misguided by Jesuits, than to the King. The Government was doing its duty in protecting German freedom of mir.d against Rome.

In the Landstag on Wednesday, the main elauses of the Bill withstanding State Grants from Roman Catholic bishops were passed by overwhelming majorities.
