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TURKEY .- Austria has sent a draft of reforms to be recommended to the Sultan by various European Governments.

The operations of the Turkish armies are impeded by heavy snows in the mountains. General Kauffman has informed his Government that unless he receives 50,000 men, with artillery, he cannot relieve the garrison at Khokhand.

The " Neue Freic Presse " telegram says the Goransko garrison, consisting of two battalions, surrendered to the Bosnian insurgents unconditionally-in all probability starved out.

A telegram from Berlin states that Turkey energetically protested to Montenegro against Montenegrins taking part in the Herzegovinian insurrection, and that the great powers support the protest.

Egyptian troops have occupied the districts of Juba and Kismayo, disarmed Zanzibar troops, and hoisted the Turkish flag.

Russia.—Increased raids on Russian soil have rendered necessary the entire oc cupation of Khokand by Russian troops.

The Russians defeated the Khokand natives on the 24th ultimo, at Balyktechi. with heavy loss.

INDIA .- The Prince of Wales on Thursday arrived at Colombo, Ceylon and at Kandy on Friday.

Advices from Penang of the 29th November state that a servant captured by Malays at the time of the murder of Mr. Birch, the English Resident, escaped and returned to British head quarters. He reports that Maharajah Lela is constructing strong stockades for the defence, and declares that the Malays will resist the English to the uttermost.

Penang, and preparations for attacking the Star, Vienot, Mahone Bay. Malays are making ripid progress.

Africa.-A Vienna telegram to the " Morning Standard" mentions a rumour that the Prince of Atyssinia, through American missionaries, has asked the assistance of the United States against the Mohammedan invaders.
