FOREIGN MISSIONS.

A cable telegram from Rev. R. sionary party, Miss Armstrong excepted. Further particulars came by the

last mail. Mr. and Mrs. Sanford left Rangoon July 17th, by the steamer Asia. There were upwards of 800 passages on board, the majority of them being soldiers belonging to the Indian Army, who were returning from Burmah to Madras. Their services had not been required in Burmah, in consequence of the king's having yielded to the demands of our Government. The passage across the Bay of Bengal was rough, but only of seven days continuance. When half-way over, one of the soldiers leaped into the sea and was drowned. He was under the influence of liquor, and met his death in that state, leaving in the ship his wife and seven children !

They arrived off Coconada on the morning of the 24th. Mr. Sanford says, " Our ship is near her anchorage off Coconada. The wind is blowing freshly from the South-west, with considerable rain. The coast here is low, and the water shallow, so that the ship lies out some four or five miles. We land by means of native boats. There is also a steam-launch, I am told. Possibly this will be available for carrying ourselves, if not our luggage."
