

Arthur S. Baker, son of deacon Leason and Seraphina Baker of Melvern Square, Annapolis Co., was born Dec. 2nd, 1852. Having early qualified himself for the position of teaching, and obtaining a B. license he spent about 5 years at the work. Being "apt to teach," he was very successful and a naturally winning disposition, gained for him the confidence and affection of both parents and pupils. But the hard work connected with faithful teaching was too great a strain upon his system and failing health obliged him to relinquish a useful position. On the 11th of March, 1874, he left home for the States hoping to regain health. But he did not forget the salvation of his soul. In a letter written to his parents, dated April 6th, he says, "I am very glad to hear of the good meetings you are enjoying. I would dearly love to be there to attend them. However I intend to be punctual at the means of grace here and perhaps I may recover good thereby." He never made a public profession of faith, but he said to those who visited him in sickness that he prayed in secret. In the presence of his parents he could say but little about death as he saw that the thought of parting was painful to his mother. In writing to an only brother from Boston and speaking of the 11th of March when he left home, he said "Had I been dying I could have left no worse than I did when taking leave of my dear mother, I could not even anticipate a reunion with the dear one at home. * * God knows I would suffer anything rather than mother should be unhappy." Every means was tried for his recovery, but all in vain. He continued to fail. On the 10th inst. he was seized with hemorrhage of the lungs and in three minutes from his commencing to bleed his spirit had taken its flight. He died clasping his mother and pleading with God for mercy. Our prayer is that grace may sustain the sorrowing and sanctify affliction to their good.
