

The sudden death of Mr. Robert A. Morton, eldest son of Rev. Robert S. Morton, of Aylesford, N. S., aged 33 years 4 months and 26 days, on the 22nd of January, was heard with extreme sorrow by a deeply attached circle of friends. Mr. Morton was an industrious, noble-hearted, strictly temperate young man. He had been for a long time in the employ of Mr. William Gilchrist, from which he entered the service of Mr. George M. Strong, and later was in the wheel-wright business on his own account. Feeling ill a week before he purchased some simple remedy and returned to his boarding house, (Mrs. Delap's, No. 30 Diecatur street), from which he never again emerged. His disease, diphtheria, baffled the skill of several physicians, and on the Saturday morning following he passed away, in the complete possession of his mental faculties, and in the full hope of a blessed immortality. He leaves a wife and two children at Lawrence town, N. S., to whom he was devoted, and who have the sympathy of all who knew their husband and father. 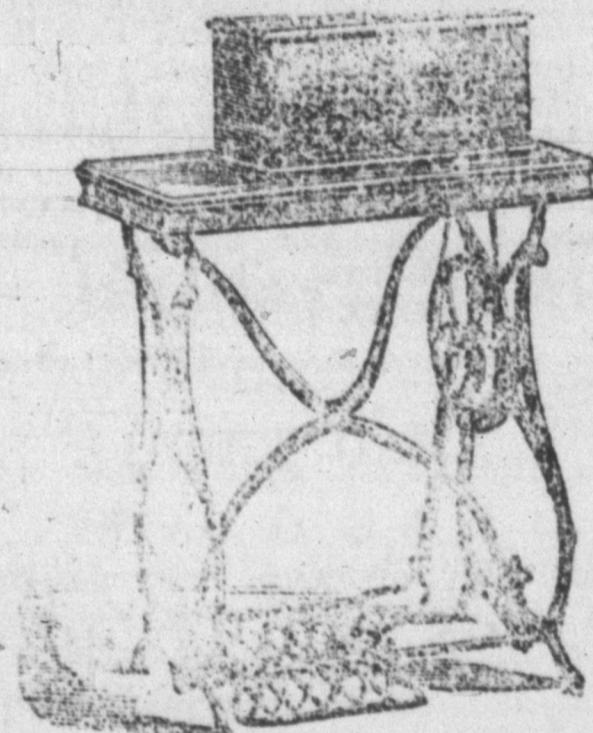

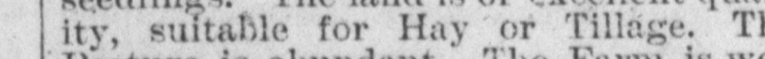
