

A large importation of thorough-bred cattle, sheep, and pigs, is on its way from England. They were to be shipped on the 19th inst., on board the mail steamer "Hibernian." On their arrival at Halifax they will be forwarded to Truro to be kept there till the time of the Provincial Exhibition, the second week in October. They will then be sold at auction as former importations have been.

Halifax harbor had in it five man-of-war steamships the past week, the Bellerophon (flag-ship), Himalaya (troop-ship), Dryad, Argus and Zephyr.

The marine who shot a horse at Bedford the other day was committed for trial in the Supreme Court.

Two fines of \$20 each were made on Wednesday last for selling liquor without license; one of whom was a man named Thomas Hawkins who had absconded about three months ago to evade prosecution, but, having returned, was picked up by the vigilant police. The other was a woman named Mary Lethbridge.

One of the largest black bears ever seen in this Province was shot at Horton a day or two ago by a man named Burgess, and was exhibited at Northup's market last week. It is to be stuffed and placed in the museum.

VICTORIA COUNTY ELECTION.—The returns shew for C. J. Campbell, (Opposition), 624; for John Ross, (Government), 524. Majority for Campbell, 100.

WESTERN COUNTIES RAILWAY.—A train, carrying Hon. Provincial Secretary and Hon. Provincial Treasurer, with other passengers, started from a point three miles from Weymouth for Yarmouth on Friday last. The construction of the Sissiboo River Railway bridge will probably occupy the contractor until next spring. Ground has been broken on the section of the line between Digby and Annapolis, and a strong force of hands is advertised for by the contractor having the work in charge.

The Yarmouth Tribune says "it is the intention of Mr. Clements, the proprietor of the Dominion, in conjunction with responsible parties in New York and Boston, to place on the Yarmouth and Boston route, as soon as railway connection with Annapolis is completed, a line of powerful steamers capable of making the passage in 17 hours, thereby reducing the time between Halifax and Boston (via Yarmouth), to 27 hours."

PICTOU.—Two or three weeks ago a scow, containing about 30 tons of dressed stone belonging to Mr. Adam McKean, while being towed across Pictou Harbor, went down in about 45 feet of water, nearly opposite Pictou Landing. Capt. W. Foster, of Fisher's Grant undertook to raise the scow and stones, which he did in less than two days. Many of the stones were heavy, weighing from 2 to 2 1/2 tons.

A PROMISING CHILD.—Lizzie Foshay, of "The Point," Pughwash, is 13 years old, weighs 239lbs., stands 5 feet 11 inches, high, is a graceful and daring equestrienne, and bids fair to take a "front seat" among the gigantic people for which Nova Scotia is already celebrated.—Amherst Gazette.

CUMBERLAND.—The grain crops are about all harvested through this county, and notwithstanding the fears which were aroused by the continued hot weather during August, farmers find that their crops will be fully up to the average.—Sentinel.

NICTAUX AND ATLANTIC RAILWAY.—The engineers, Col. Yates and Mr. Comstock, have sent for and got their families at Nictaux, and have prepared for a long stay in the country.—Everything is now ready to turn the first sod, which will be done immediately on the return of Col. Gowan, the contractor, from New York.

Here the authorities refused to act, having no jurisdiction. The authorities in Cumberland County were telegraphed to, but no answer was received, and the man made his escape on Monday morning.

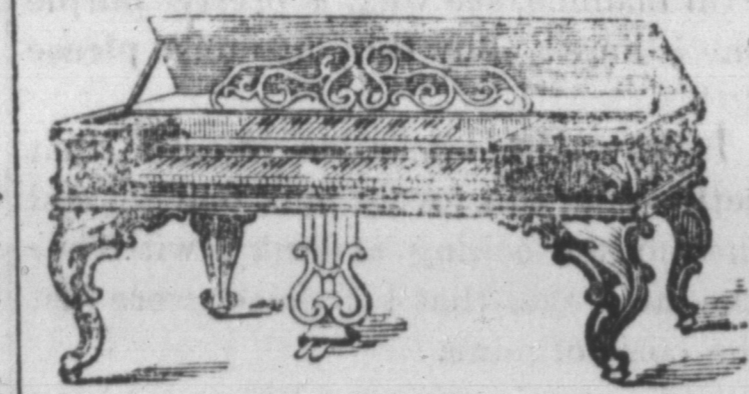

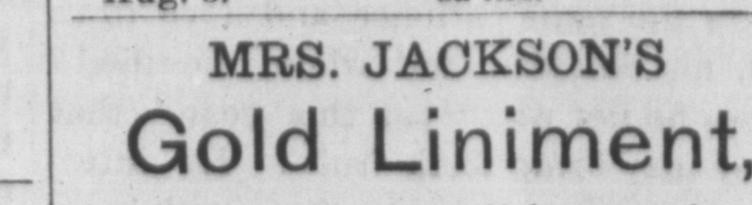
