

to re-open, between the Porte and the Ambassadors of the Powers, on the basis of the English proposals.

The Servian Prime Minister says the resumption of hostilities, in which Russia will participate, is certain.

Hostilities were re-commenced on Thursday by two distinct operations, one in front of Saitchar, the other in positions commanding Deligrad. In the latter movements the Turks captured thirteen redoubts, great quantities of arms and many prisoners. The fight was long and bloody. The Turks continued to advance, and on Saturday there was further fighting, with Turkish success.

The Servians lost 1500 men in their attempt on Saitchar, and 3000 about Deligrad.

Russia—Russia proposes a national loan of three hundred million roubles; (two hundred and twenty-million dollars).

Russia is strengthening her fortifications in Odessa and other seaboard cities.

She has ordered the mobilization of the corps d'Armee, which has its head quarters at Warsaw, and is concentrating troops in the Caucasus.

The influx of Russian soldiers into Serbia is assuming more serious proportions. Many arrive in uniform with arms; the advent of 500 a day is not unusual.

An agreement has been concluded between Roumania and Russia for placing the Roumanian troops under Russian officers in case of war.

A Times' special from Belgrade makes the important announcement that two thousand Russians have crossed the Pruth.

A St. Petersburg letter of October 11th says: "The general impression here is that Russia is on the eve of its long wished for struggle with Turkey."

Russia announces, by a circular, that in the interests of humanity she feels bound to march troops into Bulgaria and Roumania.

There are 82,000 men at the camp of Bender and 64,000 around Tiflis. The new Russian iron-clad, Peter the Great, is to leave Cronstadt immediately for the Mediterranean.

AUSTRIA.—There is a strong military party at the Austrian court who advise making common cause with Russia and introducing a policy of conquest.

The Emperor of Austria has informed the Czar that Austria would remain neutral, and make no objection to certain limited occupation of one of the Christian provinces of Turkey.

GERMANY.—The Times' Paris correspondent says symptoms of accord between Russia and Germany become more apparent daily. Austria, placed between her formidable neighbors, must ultimately obey them. The only thing which keeps Russia back is that neutrality is not enough for her. She wants Austria's co-operation.

SPAIN.—The oppressions of the government and the arrogance of the priesthood in Spain threaten to lead to insurrection.

GREECE.—Greece is putting her army on a war footing. The Ministry have submitted to the Chamber of Deputies a bill authorizing a general levy, and re-organization of the army.
