The NOT HARMLESS.—The Journaf	MOCK TURTLE SOUR - Made of the Black Bean 1 pint of black beans; 2 onions; 2 bunches of celery; marrow- bone of beef, or cold ronst beef; 1 table- spoonful of catchup; 1 lemon; 2 eggs; 1 bunch of thyme; 1 teaspoonful of cloves; 1 small teaspoonful of pepper. Soak the beans over night. In the morning pour off this water, and add 4 quarts of fresh water to the beans the onions, and celery cut up fine, salt, cloves, pepper, and thyme. 
