SHIPPING NITRO GLYCERIN .--- Professor Mowbray, of North Adams, started for Omaha last week, to get permission to ship ten tuns of nitro-glycerin over the Union Pacific Road to Virginia City for use in the Sutro tunnel. All other roads allow its transportation now, even the New York Central, which will not take baled hay for fear of fire. The nitroglycerin is carried in refrigerator cars; and as it congeals at 40°, it is easily kept frozen, and in that state it cannot be exploded. It takes about ten days be exploded. It takes about ten days to ship it to the tunnel; and if it can be taken by rail, Mr. Mowbray can have a contract for 25,000 lbs. a month for a number of years. The Professor has his new factory so systematized that but two men are kept in the works, and they can make all the nitroglycerin he can sell. 


