PROVINCIAL PARLIAMENT.

MONDAY 6th, was occupied largely in receiving Road Petitions and hearing of their claims.

ON TUESDAY after the usual number of petitions for acts of incorporation, for aid to packets, and for bridges, one in favor of Eastern Extension of our railways called forth some debate.

ON WEDNESDAY some time was spent over a petition from Mr. James A. Smith, asking for enquiry into the appointment of Mr. Major as one of the teachers of the Normal School.

HON. PROVINCIAL SECRETARY laid on the table two bills, one for the establishment of a Provincial University for examining such students as might present themselves for that purpose.

TO DALHOUSIE COLLEGE (Presbyterian) \$3,000. TO St. Mary's and St. Francis Xavier's Colleges (Roman Catholic) 3,000.

IN presenting these Bills the Hon. Provincial Secretary explained that the government were desirous of meeting the objections that had been urged against the existing state of things, and to offer a test so as to ascertain if the people desired one Provincial University.

HON. PROV. SECRETARY said the attention of the Government had been turned to the subject, but he was not aware of the precise nature of the legislation which had taken place in the Dominion Parliament on the subject.

MR. MITCHELL, of Troy, New York, was drowned yesterday in Auburn, together with two lads named John Savage and Bertie Dixon, whom he was trying to save.

IT is thought in Washington that Great Britain will claim indemnity from the United States on behalf of those Englishmen who suffered loss by the Emma mine scheme.

A freight train and one passenger car on the Branch of the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad, broke through a bridge and eleven persons were killed and wounded.

THE entire tobacco crop in Remedios district, with rare exceptions, is lost.

A storm struck Hazel Green, Wis., on Friday sweeping through the entire village, levelling to the ground about twenty-five buildings.

BRIGT Alice Abbott, of Liverpool, N. S., was abandoned at sea, dismasted and direlet. Captain and steward died of small pox, and others afflicted with the same disease.

ENGLAND.—The bill proposing a change in Queen Victoria's title to Empress of India, passed a second reading in the Commons on Thursday last.

QUEEN Victoria and Princess Beatrice on Tuesday traversed London by way of the Thames embankment, through Victoria Street, Cornhill, Leadenhall Street and White Chapel, to open the wing of the London Hospital in Whitechapel road.

THE appropriation called for by the English Government for the purpose of the Suez Canal shares was granted by the House of Commons on Monday of last week.

THE Bishop of Munster has been removed. The remains of Lady Augusta Stanley, were buried at Westminster Abbey with great pomp.

A PUBLIC MEETING was called by His Worship the Mayor on requisition for last evening at Temperance Hall, for the purpose of a discussion on One Central Teaching University for the province.

DOMINION & FOREIGN NEWS.

DOMINION OF CANADA.—A telegram from Montreal on Tuesday of last week said the frost is gone and the streets are nearly a foot deep in slush.

THE Quebec Provincial Government have decided to pay the claims of sub-contractors of the Montreal, Ottawa and Western Railroad to the amount \$400,000, besides a like amount due to the Jacques Cartier Band by contractor, Duncan McDonald.

A lady in Montreal, who is a direct descendant of Sir John Holt, Lord Chief Justice of England, in James the 2nd time, has been awarded a share of \$16,000,000, by the Court of Chancery in England.

THE House of Commons was last week engaged in considering the duties on sugar.

ON Thursday, Mr. Frechette moved for a select committee, to take into consideration the possibility of navigating the Gulf and Lower St. Lawrence during the winter season.

HON. MR. SMITH favored the motion but scarcely thought the scheme a practicable one.

MR. DAVIES supported the motion, thinking the scheme possible.

MR. DOMVILLE said the Dominion had open ports all the year round—in Halifax, St. Andrew and other places.

DR. TUPPER accused the Government of having, on suggestion of Mr. Blake, withdrawn the money pledged to be devoted to public works in the Maritime Provinces, and with having entirely failed in the execution of their duty in this particular regard.

UNITED STATES.—General Belknap was arranged before the Police Court in Washington; he waived examination, and was held in \$25,000 bail to answer further.

JUDGE ALONZO B. TAFT, of Ohio, has been appointed Secretary of War, Vice Belknap, resigned and has accepted the position.

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
