STEWED BEEF .- Housewives who are in the habit of using only steaks and roasts, mistake. A capital dish may be made out of the "chuck," as the butchers call it, or the neck, when well prepared. Select a peice of meat as large as you may require, wash it well to remove all the blood from the outside, have your dinner pot perfectly clean, salt and pepper the meat well, lay it in the bottom and cover it with water ; boil it from two to three hours, or till it is thoroughly tender; and half an onion, a sprinkle of sage, thyme, or summersavory If the meat is fat, let the water all stew out half an hour before it is put on the table, and when your meat is browned well on the lower side in the gravy, turn it over and brown the other side.

The Journal of Commerce gives the following simple receipt for the prevention of flies on horses :- Take two or three small handfuls of walnut leaves, upon which pour two or three quarts of cold water; let it infuse one night, and the next morning pour the whole into a tea-kettle, and let it boil for a quarter of an hour. When cold it will be fit for use. No more is required than to moisten a sponge. and before the horse goes out of the stable let those parts which are most irritable be smeared over with the liquid merely : between and upon the ears, the neck, the the flanks, etc.


