Dr. Homer Bost-wick used to maintain that bread so far from being the "staff of life" was the staff of death because of the earthy matter it contains, which is 0.6 per cent of the whole, and so clogs the ASSIMILATION OF METALS BY MEGE TABLES .--- In a Dutch technical journal Dr. DeLoos states that vegetables are capable of taking up metallic particles from the soil-a question much debated in the United States with reference to the use of Paris green for destroying the Colorado potato beetle. Consulted by a family suffering from lead poison ing, he found that they resided in the neighborhood of a place where the manu-facture of white lead had been carried took of regetables grown on the spot. Dr. De Loos thereupon examined specimens of red best, endive, and carrots and found lead in all. In a best weigh ing 650 grammes, he found the equiva-lent of a centigramme of metalic lead ; in six carrots, weighing together 272 grammes, he found 1# centigramme of lead. 
