On WEDNESDAY after the miscellane- done. business, which included a bill to incorporate the town of Windsor, Mr. Gayton introduced a bill to amend Chapter 25, Rev. Stat., 4th Series Of Licenses for the sale of Intoxicating Liquors. He explained that the bill introduced no essential change in the law, but was simply designed to facilitate its better working. The first section provided that in certiorari, as well as in appeal from convictions for illegalsale of liquors, the defendant be required to make oath that he has not sold liquor contrary to license. The second clause referred to selling liquor after nine o'clock. The third clause, referred to the inspecting of petitions for licenses. The fourth clause provided that the 14th section of the Act adopted last winter, which exempted the city of Halifax from the operation of the Act, be repealed. As was well known, this law was applied to the city as the bill passed the House, but was changed in the Council. He might say that the bill came from the Standing Committee on Temperance, and he thought there could be no objections to its passage."
