The commanders of Sistova, Simnitza, Bucharest and Jassy have received orders from Russian headquarters to prepare all possible means of transport for wounded men.

Since the success at Kars one party at the Russian headquarters urges, as the Turks have stripped Roumania of troops, that the Russians should make a dash through Shipka and the neighboring passes as soon as Mehemet Ali commences a movement to raise the seige of Plevna. The Russians have sixty thousand men concentrated in the neighborhood of Tirnova available for such op-

there are several causes of contention between Russia and Servia still unsettled. It is believed Russia is disinclined to accept all the conditions demanded by

Gen Melikoff, when summoning Mukhtar Pasha to evacuate Erzeroum, informed him of the capture of Kars, and that if he resisted he would be attacked by eighty thousand men with overwhelming artillery. Muckhtar replied that he would hold Erzeroum to the last.

General Melikoff started suddenly for Erzeroum on Sunday. He will take command of the besieging forces there.

At a council of war at Phillippoff a prominent General recommended that a corps be left to cover Erzeroum while the remainder of the army pushed through Asia Minor to Scutari.

The Moscow Gazette states that the Russian main army is advancing on Erzeroum.

A despatch from Vienna says so far from its being weakened, the Czarowitch's army now consists of eight infantry and four cavalry divisions, numbering from 80,000 to 90,000 men, and though it aged 45 years. must go over the line from the Danube to the vicinity of Tirnova, it will not be easy for the Turks to make much impression upon it since the Russians, by forced marches, can concentrate three or four divisions on any given point in a single day. Russian newspapers express a strong desire for peace.


