

pared for man in Eden, and how much true philosophy and taste shine in the simple words that "in Paradise God planted trees" pleasant to the eye, as well as, "good for food." Other things being equal, the nearer we can return to those primitive tastes the greater will be our sensuous enjoyment, and the better the influence of our pleasures in our moral nature, because they will then depend on the cultivation of tastes at once natural and harmless, and will not lead us to communion with, and reverence for, merely human genius, but will conduct us into the presence and the infinite perfection of the Creator."

Dr. Dawson believes, as do the large majority of men of science, and of educated men generally, that the world was created in six days—not natural days, of twenty-four hours each, but probably millions of years, as we calculate.

The word "day" is of course generally understood in its literal sense; but not always, for the whole period of the creation is styled "the day" (Gen. iii. 4-6);—we are told that "one day is with the Lord as a thousand years; and the expression "day of the Lord" frequently used to mark, not a particular time, but an event, the chronology of which is not assigned or assignable. In fact, a great many of the common notions of men on these points require correction. As education advances, they will be corrected. The books which Dr. Dawson publishes will do much to promote sound judgment, and at the same time to confirm faith in God's word.

We advise all our ministers, old and young, and our young friends who are pursuing their studies, to procure Dr. Dawson's volume, and to read it carefully. We think, too, that science, in all its discoveries and details, should have a higher place assigned to it by educated men, secular and ecclesiastical, than it sometimes obtains. Some of them seem to be afraid of it. They should be better taught.

TEACHERS' CONVENTION.

All interested in the cause of Education in our Province will be pleased to learn that the Teachers' Association is to convene in Halifax during the Christmas vacation. The Convention have, doubtless, accomplished much good in the past, but, perhaps, they have partially failed in their main object—to aid Teachers in their work—by not engaging more fully in practical discussion upon the work of Teaching. We are informed that Teachers in the City and elsewhere, realize this fact, and that a different programme is to be furnished this year. A number of Teachers have agreed to deliver Addresses, and others, prepare papers, all having a practical bearing upon the teaching profession.

We doubt not a large representation of Teachers will attend the ensuing Convention and enter heartily into a discussion of the topics suggested by the Committee—an outline of which we are promised for our next issue.

Such Conventions confer great benefits upon Teachers, and through them upon the youth of our country. It is impossible for Teachers thus to discuss matters connected with their vocation and not receive profit, in reference to School discipline, Text Books to be

employed, the means of inducing progress in study, importance of parental co-operation &c., &c.

Through this agency, too, Teachers may be led to realize the dignity of their profession and in a corporate capacity exert greater influence upon the Educational interests of the country and secure all necessary legislation in reference thereto. It is to be hoped that the day is approaching when a larger number of enthusiastic men will choose the teaching profession as their life work. To accomplish this Teachers must labour to raise the profession so as secure the remuneration received in other professions.
