When Baptists are invited to mount an union team, would it not be well, before accepting the invitation, to observe well whether it is moving toward Jerusalem or Babylon. There need be no mistake; if the directors require that any portion of God's Word shall be suppressed, then for certain they are moving toward the latter. Now some modern, far-famed Revivalists seem to resemble Jehu of old. They drive fast, display great zeal for God in slaying the worshippers of Baal. No one can doubt but that they are in this respect doing the will of God. They cause a great sensation. The inhabitants of cities and villages are moved, and there is, without doubt, some reform. While it is doubtless these calves of gold became the great sin of Israel, for although they had many other idols, yet we find that none were so aggravating to God, and none so hard to part with as these. There were many reformers from time to time in Israel, and many idols were destroyed, but those calves remained until Israel was carried captive to Assyria. (See Hosea 10, 5-6, and 2nd Kings, 17, 22-23.) Now the golden calves of christendom are Infant Baptism (so-called) and Baptismal Regeneration. Inasmuch as they are regarded by a large proportion of professing christians more than the example and teaching of Christ, the originators of the error, thought it more convenient, and so recommended it. And although there have been from time to time, all along through the past history of christianity, great Reformers, who have been the means, under God, of great good, still these calves are not destroyed, but are to this day the great sin of many of the so-called Christian agree to labour in union meetings with those who hold to such grievous errors, and where Christ's example and last and great command must not be faithfully and prominently presented for fear of offending co-workers or some of the congregation, is not wise. So did not Paul. He could say, I have not shunned to declare unto you all the counsel of God. The whole truth will doubtless offend some. When Jesus preached and fed the hungry multitudes he gained many followers, but when he told them no man can come unto Me except the Father which hath sent Me draw him; and that except they should eat the flesh and drink the blood of the Son of Man they could have no life in them, (see the 6th Chapter of John), from that time many of His disciples went away and walked no more with Him. "It is enough that the servant be as his Lord." No desire to retain large audiences, or fear of offending their dearest friend, can justify God's servants in shunning to declare all that Jesus has commanded. 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that any thing but immersion was the when persons have professed to have been converted, and have become convinced that they ought to be immersed, according to New Testament teachings, and have asked to be baptized, that they have been told by the leaders of the meeting that it is of no consequence, and that they had better say nothing about it, at least, until these union asked, where in the New Testament can be found a command or even a permission for a believer not to be baptized, or even to put it off for a single day? To the law and to the testimony, God's word is to be the christian's light and guide. And, says Paul to the Ephesians, " walk as children of light, proving what is acceptable unto the Lord, and have no fellowship with the unfruitful works of darkness, but rather reprove them. Wherefore come out from among them and be ye separate saith the Lord. Let Baptists see to it that they be not entangled with error, however anxious they may feel to be united with others in revival work. But perhaps some of those union brethren will say, although we unite with Pedobaptists and others in revival meetings, we do not thereby embrace or even favor their errors. They may think so; but if they agree to suppress or mystify the plain teachings of Christ and the Apostles, or not to expose what they know to be errors in religion, in order to please brethren of other denominations, are they not in effect saying of them, "Let the men that sacrifice kiss the calves." (See Hosea 13, 2.) Let whatever doctrine or practice that has not a Thus saith the Lord, for it, be faithfully denounced; and every command and example of Jesus be faithfully taught and obeyed. But then, after all, baptism is but as it were the first step in the christian race, the putting on of the badge of the christian soldier. The race has yet to be run, the battle yet to be fought. Perhaps it is not so easy to get to heaven as some true that all who do truly believe on Christ will be saved, in spite of the world, the flesh and the devil, it is equally true that they will have to contend with the world, the flesh and the devil to the very end of the race, and it is folly to teach or think otherwise, for it is written, " All that will live godly in Christ Jesus shall suffer persecution." PRESBYTERIAN.—Rev. Mr. Horne was rescued from the water, but he died on the following morning from the injuries sustained by the fall.

THE GOSPEL IN SIAM. - The Rev-McFarland, of the Presbyterian mission in Siam writes from Petchaburi that "every feature of our work here is encouraging. The congregations are larger and more interested than ever. The spirit of euquiry is more manifest among the people than formerly. At our last Communion, the first Sabbath of July, three persons were added, on examination and baptism, to this church. Others are enquiring." The Government has granted the request of the missionaries to allow the native Christians to take the Christian oath, instead of the pagan oath; but it refuses to allow the noblemen to swear their allegiance to the King by any but the old pagan oath. As one of the noblemen is much interested in Christianity, the refusal is a disappointment to the missionaries. Polygamy is another obstacle to the conversion of the nobility.

Pan-Presbyterianism in both hemispheres-in the Old World and the New -has been seized with a desire to modify its Confession. The General Assembly at Victoria—which, as becomes an Antipodean institution, holds its May meetings in November - concluded its sittings at the departure of the last Australian mail, and, from the report of the proceeding in the Melbourne newspapers, we observe that it has appointed a Committee "to prepare a memorial to the Pan-Presbyterian Council, asking their advice in regard to the modification of the Westminster Confession.—London Paper.

There are 19,379 Sunday-schools in the United States in connection with the Methodist Episcopal Sunday-School

A new Wesleyan Church was to be opened in Rome, on the 29th April, in the Via della Scrofa, just opposite the palace of Monsignor La Valetta, the cardinal vicar. The church is under the ministry of the Rev. Mr. Piggott.

The first Christian church in Constantinople was founded in 1846; there are now seventy-six in the Turkish empire, about a third of which are self supporting and all self-governing. Four "Evangelical Unions" have been formed for mutual counsel and aid : one at Harpoot, twenty-three churches; and another in Bithynia of eleven churches. Connected with these churches are 3,303 members, with a population of over 18,000 native Protestants.

Since the suspension of the Rev. Arthur Tooth, the organ at St. James's, Hatchman, had been barricaded up, but the Rev. B. Dale, the curate in charge, has had the barricade removed, and the organ is again used. Mr. Dale wished to have certain portions of the service monotoned, but about a dozen prominent members of the Protestant League objected to this, and persisted in reading those portions in a very loud voice; the choir however maintained their ground, but the confusion was considerable.

The Liberator states that, as the result of further inquiry, it has learned that eleven times in seventeen yearsfrom 1860 to 1877—the senior wrangler has not been a member of the Church of England, and it adds-" an astonishing and highly suggestive fact."

A queer bequest is that of Miss Max well Graham, of Williamswood, Eng., who has left \$100,000 to four charitable societies, wherewith to relieve poor protestants who are named Hutchison or Maxwell, and to educate their children.
