These delightful stories are worthy to be ranked with Sophie May's best work, which, of course is high praise. 'Flossy' and 'Bossy' are two 'really' little girls, the daughter of a 'really' clergyman, and two very sweet, bright and truthful little creatures they are.

KIND QUESTIONS by A. M. Stalker, Southampton, with an introduction by Rev. Jos. Angus, D. D., London. Second Edition. E. Stock, London, pp. 130, price one shilling.

These 'Kind Questions' and answers to them were originally published as a series of tracts, but at the request of Mr. Spurgeon they have been combined into one pamphlet.

Dr. Angus in his Introduction says: 'Believers' Baptism' is one of the chief questions of the age. It is a standing protest in favour of the Protestant principle—that the Bible alone is the religion of Protestants! and it is a standing protest against Formalism on the one hand, and against Popery on the other.

All readers will admire the spirit of these 'Questions.' The writer loves all who love our Lord, signs for a united Church, speaks 'the truth in love,' and pleads for the 'one Baptism' as the symbol of the 'one Faith.'

It may suggest somewhat what is comprised in this little book if we copy the questions asked. They are as follows:

- (1.) Are not all Christians one in Christ?
(2.) Seeing all Christians are One in Christ, Why ought Baptism to be studied, and How?
(3.) Christian Baptism—What is it?
(4.) Infant Baptism—Whence came it?
(5.) Infant Baptism—Whence came it?
(6.) Infant Baptism—What are its fruits?

It is a long time since we have seen the same amount of truth and that so ably supported, compressed in as small a compass as we find in these Questions and answers. We should feel sorry for the Pedo-baptist who could read these plain statements, and still retain his views and practices in reference to the baptism of infants.
