

REFORM MOVEMENT IN HALIFAX.

Mr. Banks McKenzie of Boston asisted by others, notably Mr. Neil of the Inebriate Asylum of Dartmouth, and Mrs. Goff of Philadelphia, has commenced reform work in Halifax, similiar to that carried on in many parts of the United States where great success has attended these undertakings. Meetings have been held in the market building near the Dartmouth Ferry. They have been crowded to overflowing. Ministers and other friends of temperance in the City patronize these meetings. Mr. McKenzie has had sad experience in drunkenness. This experience he uses freely in his discourses. His whole heart is in the work. A society has been organized, called the Reformed Club. It is made up of those only who have been to a greater or less extent victims of strong drink. So soon as drunkards sign the pledge and pass one day in abstinence, Mr. McK. brings them out before the audience to speak and give the benefit of their first experience in the ways of temperance. Prayers and religious hymns are mingled with the exercises. The movement bids fair to be successful. Some of the meetings have been held in Temperance Hall. Large numbers of laboring men and women attend, and doubtless many of them are habitual drinkers, and not a few drunkards. Should the Spirit of God be poured out upon these meetings in answer to prayer, and in connexion with these zealous labours, permanent reforms may be looked for in large numbers. Many are praying that God will bless the efforts of Mr. McKenzie and Mrs. Goff.

The presence of Mrs. G. in the city at the same time that Mr. McKenzie is here, is the result of accident and not of concerted plan. She is not engaged with Mr. McKenzie in this work. Mrs. G. speaks fluently and effectively and is likely to do much good. Efforts are made to organize on a larger scale for work in this reform movement.

Nathan D. Hammett, Photographer, Liverpool, N. S., has sent us an excellent picture of the entrance to the Baptist Church, taken during the late session of the Western Baptist Association just as the delegates and brethren were coming out. Those who were there, as well as many of their friends, will recognize the countenances of a large number of those present, and pronounce it one of the triumphs of art. It is pleasant to read of the ready sympathy gushing forth from Christian hearts, as soon as the fountain was struck by the knowledge of the suffering ones in St. John. We find a communication in the *Canadian Baptist* describing the process at one of our churches in Toronto. The writer says:

"Many Baptists had given liberally to the general relief fund; but the response to a call for a collection in Jarvis St. Baptist church was worthy of the cause. The ladies of the Baptist churches in this city were very successful in private collections, and the money has been invested in garments ready made, and in material for garments. A three days' sewing meeting was held in the parlor of Jarvis St. church, at which every Baptist church in the city was represented by faithful, earnest workers. A number of these attended each day from ten until six; all would have been there had not other duties conflicted."

The garments, bought at fabulously low prices from generous merchants, who had before contributed, consisted of boys' suits, ladies' sacques, a large supply of hose, shirts, and a variety of articles which cannot fail to be acceptable. The committee gratefully acknowledge whole pieces of goods, which, as far as possible, were made into garments, and the remnants, thirteen in all, were packed with other goods. Besides this, there were 422 cast-off garments all very good; and the number of garments made in three days were 264, mostly for women and children: these we shall not enumerate; but when it is known that among that number were fifteen walking suits made and trimmed by skilful hands, one can realize there were not many idle moments. Indeed the spirit of active Christian love was pre-eminent,—the very machines in their busy whirl told the story of sympathy. Two large cases were forwarded to the Rev. Mr. Carey, and he with the Rev. Mr. Pope, will distribute to the needy Baptist."

The Dorcas are not all dead yet, either in Toronto or Halifax, we are happy to say.


