The weather has set in warm much earlier than usual. On Friday last the heat was intense—the thermometer standing at from 84° to 90° in the shade. Sunday, too, was a very warm day. This is almost unprecedented, and has initiated the bathing season in our harbor.

The big sewer at Freshwater is being extended and will be a great boon to the neighbourhood. The picturesque old trees which stood on the margin of the stream however are being taken away.

A HIGH SCHOOL is at length to be commenced in Halifax. The Masonic Hall has been engaged for the purpose by the School Commissioners.

The S. P. C. A. is actively engaged in bringing to justice parties who have animals and use them improperly. It is well that the poor dumb brutes have other friends than their often inhuman owners, who from greed or poverty often refuse to regard the life of their beast.

THE FREEMASONS are to-day to have a Grand Gala day with a Procession in connexion with the Dedication of their Hall at the south end of Granville Street. The Masons are to appear in regalia and the numerous other signs and symbols of the craft, and proceed with bands of music through the principal streets from Queen Street, commencing at 3 p. m., by Morris St. to the New Hall, where the dedicatory ceremonies will be proceeded with.

In the evening and next day the Freemasons' Grand Bazaar will be held. A fine Art Gallery and Salmon breeding Exhibition will form additional attractions. The proceeds are to go towards decorating the interior of the building. The pictures for the Art Gallery will comprise some of the finest paintings in the city, borrowed for the occasion.

Mackerel are appearing in good quantities around our coast. St. Mary's Bay and Digby Basin have been well supplied. The weirs have furnished hundreds of barrels to their owners. They are finer than usual. On the western shores of Halifax County considerable takes have rewarded the industrious fishermen.

Whilst so many have been taken, a much larger number had to be liberated, the weirs being insufficient to retain them. The water was filled with them for miles, and what would have filled thousands of barrels escaped again to sea.

BRIDGEWATER, May 30, 1877.—NICTAUX AND ATLANTIC RAILROAD.—Mr. Editor.—SIR:—Actual work was commenced on this railroad at Middleton on Thursday, 23rd inst. The first five miles are under contract and a large number of men and teams are at work. The second five miles, south of the iron mines, are being located and will be under contract in a few days, if not given out already. The Engineers are to be at Bridgewater and Lunenburg during next week to survey and locate for construction. The Contract calls for the completion of twenty miles of the road from the Lunenburg terminus North, and sixteen miles from Middleton, South, within one year and the completion of the whole line within eighteen months. The Company have been fortunate in completing contracts for the construction of this important railroad. With men of sterling ability and worth, therefore, the public may expect this road to be opened for traffic at the time specified in contracts. The perseverance and energy of the President, Mr. Sterns, cannot be too highly spoken of. When the road is completed all we need is a similar spirit of enterprize on the part of our people to make this road one of great importance. It will be one of the best constructed in this Province.

THE COLE HARBOR DYKE.—It is said that Mr. O'Brien has abandoned his contract at Cole Harbor, through failure to obtain security for further delay. The material will shortly be brought to the city. The destruction caused during the past winter by the ice and heavy seas appears to have completely disheartened those engaged in this enterprise; but we hope the abandonment is not permanent. It is to be regretted that complete success did not attend the efforts of the promoters of the project; and the pecuniary loss sustained, though large, is only a small item in comparison with the large advantages which would have naturally resulted from the successful completion of the work.—Rec.

Bear River, Annapolis County, had a vessel of 340 tons half finished destroyed by fire about one o'clock on Tuesday morning. The workmen's tools too were burned. The vessel was valued at \$7000, the property of Messrs. Rice.

Another iron bridge is to be built for the Windsor and Annapolis Railway near Avonport. It is to cost \$12000.
