ENGLAND.—The Eastern question was briefly discussed in the House of Lords on a motion of Strathedon for an address to the Queen praying that Her Majesty would adopt measures to prevent hostilities, secure adherence to treaties and promote the welfare of races subject to Turkey. Earl Grey made a strong Anti-Russian speech; he deprecated interference between the Turks and their subjects. Strathedon's motion was rejected.

The British fleet is under orders to leave the Piræus, to refit and give leave of absence to men, preparatory to a • cruise during the summer. Political reasons no longer render the presence of the squadron necessary in Eastern waters.




