OpEN Your windows and Doors．
－It is a common error to suppose that
a rom can be ventilated by opening a
window a little at the top．There
must be an inlet and an outlet for the
air．It is another mistake to suppose
that foul air goes to the top of a room．
It is the heated air that goes to the top，
while the chief impurity，carbonic acid
falls to the bottom．It is the lower
stratum of air that needs to be removed．
If the window only be open，the cold
air，being heavier，pours down into the
room，auysing dranghts，if the door be
only ajar，the same thing occurs．The
pertection of ventilation may be obtain－
ed in a room with a fire place by simply
providing proper inlets for the air，on a
level with the floor，and carried verti－
cally upward into the room for abont
