

BARRINGTON.—A telegram to the Chronicle on Thursday said: The schr. Codeeaker, Capt. Brown bound from Halifax to Barrington, capsized on Wednesday night off Cape Sable. The Captain and two men landed at Barrington in a dory on Thursday morning. The others were lost. She had thirteen of a crew, five of whom were married.

Halifax has received a large accession of Roman Catholic priests from all quarters in preparation for the consecration of Dr. Hannan as Archbishop. It is expected that three Archbishops, ten Bishops, and about sixty priests will take part in the ceremony on Sunday next.

Great improvements are to be made on the Windsor and Annapolis Railway. They comprise an iron bridge over the Gaspeux River and a large embankment near Hantsport. An aboiteau over the Halfway River to be partially paid for by the dyke proprietors to cost \$30,000. Some handsome new cars are also in the course of construction.
