Local News.

The Third Baptist Church Exhibition, opened on Tuesday of last week, has proved a great success. The basement of the building being erected and covered in, a number of our city merchants accepted the invitation to place some of their most choice goods in the building for exhibition. A number of valuable relics of former times were also gathered together from various parties. Works of art were also brought together, making up an immense variety of handsome goods, furniture, photography, books, gas-fittings and ancient and modern curiosities. We cannot begin to enumerate them, but we fancy the exhibitors will find that their establishments are better known for this advertisement of their handsome wares. A refreshment table runs down the centre of the room supplying meals at a reasonable charge. The exhibition was visited by hundreds of people every day each paying 10 cents for admission. It is also being continued this week. It was thought by some, that such a movement would be a doubtful speculation but it has proved a very remunerative one, and our friends will probably make a thousand dollars by the operation, enabling them to finish the plastering of the basement and rooms for various purposes in their christian work. Doing this without adding to the debt on the original purchase of the lot, they will soon be able to put up the upper part of the church. Until then, however, they will have excellent accommodation for public worship and their Sabbath School operations in the basement.

At the meeting of the Halifax School Board on Wednesday last. It was resolved to increase the salaries of the Supervisor and Secretary to \$1,400 each.

Mr. Belcher moved that the Governors of Dalhousie College and the City Council be conferred with to ascertain if the South end of the Grand Parade could not be obtained for a High School site. The resolution was referred to the Teachers' Committee.

Archbishop Hannan administered the rite of confirmation on Sunday to 495 persons at St. Mary's Chapel, probably the fruit of the Jesuit Father Glackmeyer's missionary visit to this city.

His Excellency the Vice Admiral and the squadron under his command will leave Halifax, for Bermuda and the West Indies, on or about the 7th of November ensuing.

Snow has at length made its appearance here. On Friday morning the ground was just whitened, but it soon vanished. At Truro and parts northward there was much more, the cars coming in with their tops covered with "the beautiful."

The Ladies Sale of Fancy Goods for the INFANTS' HOME last week was not favored with fine weather, but the articles sold quickly and well. The efforts of these benevolent ladies to protect and save infant life deserve all encouragement.

DARTMOUTH.—At the Police Court last week a woman named Martha Werner, who keeps a drinking establishment, was fined \$20 and costs for selling liquor to minors.

One of our morning papers states that a ferry was established between Halifax and Dartmouth one hundred and twenty years since, the fare being then fixed at three pence between sunrise and sunset, and doubled between sunset and sunrise.

Mr. Aubrey Hunt, son of the late Superintendent of Education, has been appointed to the vacant office of book-keeper in the Hospital for the Insane.

Mr. Robert Ellis, of Sheffield's Mills, King's County, aged 72 years, died very suddenly on Monday last week. He was in his usual good health at breakfast time, and expired shortly after, it is supposed from disease of the heart. Mr. Ellis had been a leading man in the Wesleyan Church for many years.

At Amherst on Saturday evening a fire broke out in Holmes and Hicks' carriage shops, and Rhodes', Curry and Dodge's steam wooden manufacturing buildings were also destroyed. Loss about ten thousand dollars.

The Berwick Star reports that as a car was being shunted into the siding at Berwick Station on Wednesday, a son of Mr. Joseph Kinsman, 10 years of age, who was climbing up the end of a flat car, was caught between the buffers. One of his legs was so badly crushed that it had to be amputated.

On Friday morning Mr. H. Teen, one of the proprietors of the new Furniture Company at Oxford, fell from the third floor in the new building in course of erection, and received considerable injury about the head and chest.

Mr. DUTCHER lectured at Annapolis last week and proposes holding meetings at Bridgetown, Kentville, Wolfville, Windsor, Truro and Amherst, and if friends to the cause make arrangements, in Halifax and St. John.

YARMOUTH is proceeding with the Temperance reform there. On Monday of last week a raid was made by about twenty five magistrates and leading citizens of the town upon the liquor-sellers. Several places were visited and quite a large quantity of liquor seized under the destruction clause of the licence law.

Mr. D. B. McKenzie is at work at New Glasgow, holding public meetings. On the first night 119 signed the pledge, some of them hard cases. Hawkesbury makes a good report of itself in this line.

Capt. John Sheridan, is at present operating upon two sunken vessels near Arichat.

The schooner Frank Newton, which arrived on Sunday, brought thirteen casks of whale oil from Lunenburg. It was obtained from a dead whale found floating off that place, by a colored man named Henry Weevil some time ago.
