recent rains the Russians are convinced of the impossibility of wintering in Bulgaria, and will make a desperate effort to effect a reduction of Plevna and defeat Suleiman Pasha's army before retirement into Roumania becomes necessary. Russia would thus stand in a better position should diplomacy intervene during the cessation of operations.

Special despatches to the Presse says Kars has been bombarded, and that a part of the city is on fire. The place is provisioned for four months.

Suleiman Pasha telegraphs under date of October 25th, as follows: "To-day twelve Russian battalions with cavalry and artillery attacked Rustchuk. The Turks made a sortie and forced the Russians to retire into their entrenchments at Pyrogs, with the loss of 450 killed and wounded. Four Russian divisions attacked the Turkish line in the Lom from Govancifflick, near Kosovo, on the right to Solenik on the left. They were repulsed with the loss of 800 killed and some prisoners. The Turkish loss was 134 killed and 60 wounded.

It is reported that the Russians are pursuing Ghazi Mukhtar, and have advanced as far as Kharoshan and that Muskhtar Pasha has retreated to Koprikoi, between Khorashan and Hosham Kalah.

Erzeroum is preparing for a seige. The inhabitants are arming, and rein forcements are hastening from Trebizond.

Russia.-The News Bucharest correspondent says, after making a tour of inspection of the Czarowitch's position, he is convinced a winter campaign is impossible with the existing transport system. Already fodder sometimes fails for days.

Prince Sergius of Leuchtenberg, aid of the Emperor of Russia, was killed in the recent reconnoissance of the Czaro-

Russian losses to the 18th are officially stated to be 60,100 men.

The Standard's correspondent at Biela reports that the Czarowitch is rushing forward against Rasgrad, leaving one corps to operate against Rustchuck. It is officially announced that order is

restored in the southern portion of the Province of Daghestan. Insurrection is still troublesome in the north, but its importance has been exaggerated and and its success impossible.

A Russian official despatch dated Tutchenitza, before Plevna, Oct. 25th, says: Yesterday after a desperate engagement of ten hours Gourko's detached division, co-operating with a portion of the Imperial Gaurds, captured a strong Turkish position between Guroyi Dubuk and Teliche. Gourko then stationed himself on the Sofia road, strengthening his position with new fortifications. This engagement also resulted in the capture of Achmet Errsi Pasha, his chief of staff and many other Turkish officers. About 3000 foot soldiers, an entire regment of cavalry, four cannon and a quantity of rifles and ammunition were also captured. Our loss is unknown but must have been considerable.

A Russian officer just from Plevna says no convoy entered Plevna since General Gourko took command of cavalry. The investiture is complete. The Imperial Guards, as fast as they arrived, took up positions on the Russian left, thus gradually prolonging the line of investment across the Lovatz road to Sofia road. The investment by infantry then extends from Roumanian positions north of Plevna to Sofia road on west.

On the west, girdle is completed by Gerouko's cavalry, which can cut off all supplies, but the Russians are every day receiving reinforcements, and there is every appearance that they intend to surround Plevna by a series of works, as the German did Paris. The Russians will soon have troops enough to complete their infantry investment. There is reason to believe that Plevna is not victualled to stand a seige until Spring, and appearances are that Osman Pasha will attempt, probably unsuccessfully, to fight his way out. The correspondent concludes :- The question of a second campaign is resolutely faced, and prospects look more hopeful for Russians than since General Kruidener's defeat in July.

constitution. AUSTRIA.—The Austrian budget for 1878, presented to Reichsrath on Tuesday, shows a deficit of 20,200,000 florins against 37,800,000 for 1877. The minister of finance said he hoped the equilibrium would be established by 1880.
