

of nationality and to protect Christians from violence. The Grand Duke Nicholas crossed the river at Petrachin and declares that 50,000 Russians now occupy the southern side of the stream. By this passage at Simnitza both Widdin and Nicopolis are isolated from the Turkish quadrilateral.

GREECE.—Advices from Salonica report the discovery of a conspiracy among the Greeks and several arrests have been made, among the prisoners being some professors and many students.

EGYPT.—Alexandria advices from Massowah contradict the rumors of conclusion of peace between Abyssinia and the Khedive. The former demands the Abyssinian territory occupied by the Egyptians.

The recent attempt to blow up the Suez Canal is confirmed. The Khedive is taking effective measures to prevent a repetition.
