The story of the hanging of four Austrian polish surgeons of the "Society of the Red Crescent," at Sofia, by General Gourko, has been persistently and circumstantially reiterated in the face of the denials of the Russian and Austrian Governments. A correspondent of the Vienna Politische Correspondez has made an investigation of the story and found it utterly groundless. He interviewed Dr. Gebhart, one of the surgeons alleged to have been executed, who said that Gourko gave all the surgeons at Sofia full liberty of action.

The National Zeitung says the Austrian Government has been positively informed that the Russians are concentrating on the Austrian frontier.

GREECE. - Hobart Pasha having agreed not to bombard the villages on the coast of Thessaly, the insurgent leaders consented to enter into negotiations with him at Volo. It is reported that Hobart Pasha has offered the insurgents auto nomy.


