WINDSOR.—The members of the Baptist church and congregation held a very pleasant meeting in their vestry on the evening of April 4th.

At the Olive Baptist Church, Montreal on the 7th inst eight—three males and five females—were baptized in the presence of a congregation that completely filled the Tabernacle and class rooms.

The fire was not extinguished till Sunday forenoon. The building belonged to Mr. Fordham who will lose heavily by the destruction of a large stock of leather stored in the cellar.

It seems at present very uncertain how the fire originated, but on Friday night there was an entrance effected by some person or persons into Mr. Evans' store, and a drawer forced open in which cash had been usually kept.

It is there-fore concluded that it was the work of an incendiary. We hope that the investigation will discover the guilty party.

The Halifax High School site is being cleared in preparation for building. It comprises the corner block on South Brunswick, Sackville and Albermarle Streets.

Joseph H. Saunders, of Ohio, Yarmouth Co., had one of his hands so badly shattered by the bursting of his gun, on the 27th ult., while in the act of firing at a flock of ducks, that it had to be amputated.

Within the space of nine days four children of Capt. Abram M. Hatfield died of Diphtheria—on the 30th March a son aged four years; on the 6th April a daughter and a son aged respectively 7 years and 6 months; April 8th, a daughter, aged 2 years.

The good ship Roseneth with her usual regularity, as the first Spring ship from Scotland, appeared on Sunday.

On Thursday morning last an investigation into the cause of the late fire in Dartmouth was held, and warrants issued for the arrest of several persons on suspicion.

A MOST DISASTROUS FIRE

occurred here on Sunday last. It commenced about 1/2 past 3 in the morning in the back part of Mr. Howard C. Evans' store on Lockman Street, and soon communicated with the adjoining store of Mr. A. Fordham on Water Street. The firemen were soon on the spot and it was supposed had succeeded in subduing the flames when a loud explosion occurred and shook the place all around.

Among those who went down into the cellar to help in this work was Dr. Moren, the City Medical officer who administered to Mr. Howell in his painful situation.

Two families occupied the rooms over Mr. Fordham's store, named Purcell and Muleahy. The escape of these was cut off by the stairs being burnt.

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FATAL ACCIDENT.—The barque Stone-wall Jackson, arrived at Boston on the 9th inst., from Havre, reports, Feb. 15, Manning Ellis, a seaman, a native of Scots Bay, N. S., fell from the topsail yard to the deck, fracturing his skull; he died same day and was buried at sea.

A CENTENARIAN.—On the 27th of March last Mrs. Catherine Fleet died at Ecum Secum, in this county, at the age of 109. She was born in the Western part of the Province and many years ago came with her husband to Ecum Secum, where she resided till her death.

CLERGY AND LAITY.—A Churchman thus complains in the Times:—"The clergy of late have shown a great disposition to separate themselves from the laity, to set up different interests, and claim independent rights. This is notably the case in the matter of the Burial Bill. Not content with uniting with the lay members of the Church in protecting their joint rights, they claim to have a special grievance and must have a petition of their own.

Two princesses of the Prussian Royal family were married on Monday evening in the chapel of the Palace at Berlin, namely, the Princess Charlotte, granddaughter of the Emperor William and of Queen Victoria, and the Princess Elizabeth, his Majesty's niece.
