The good ship Roseneath with her usual regularity, as the first Spring ship from Scotland, appeared on Sunday. A MOST DISASTROUS FIRE occurred here on Sunday last. It commenced about 1 past 3 in the morning in the back part of Mr. Howard C. Evans' store on Lockman Street, and soon communicated with the adjoining store of Mr A. Fordham on Water Street. The Firemen were soon on the spot and it was supposed had succeeded in subduing the flames when a loud explosion occurred and shook the place all around. The flames darted up into the heavens and the utmost confusion followed. Still the firemen worked on, and were working inside the building in endeavouring to save the property. It was soon observed that the floor above had been displaced by the explosion, and was settling down on the men below. Alarm was given and all ran from the burning building except two who were by some means caught by the descending flour. These two were members of the Union Protection Company, Mr. Edw. Fredericks, Druggist, and Mr. William Howell, Machinist. The whole force was now given to the rescuing of these brave men from their perilous situation. Two men, W. Tierney and E. Phalan ven tured to go into the burning building and down into the cellar to search for their comrades. It was feared as there was fire all around them that they had met with so much fire and smoke that they too were suffocated. They shortly after appeared with the dead body of lienced better health than for forty years Mr. Fredericks who had been struck | before. I had been under the treatment by a falling letter-press and timbers, and it appeared instantly killed. was also found that Mr. Howell was alive but so held down that he could not get out or help himself. An openso as to speak to him. His face was downwards and he was becoming very weak. The efforts were all directed

to rescuing him from what appeared his inevitable doom. Among those who went down into the cellar to help in this work was Dr. Moren, the City Medical officer who administered to Mr. Howell in his painful situation. With the aid of jack-screws to lift the beams that were pressing on the imprisoned man, and other appliances after about three hours, during which time he had been half drowned by water, and in the most eminent danger of being burned alive, he was released, taken out, and carried to his home, amidst the shouts of the company who were so much rejoiced over the rescue. Mr. Howell's coolness and presence of mind served him greatly in the terrible danger he had passed through. It seems most marvellous that no bones were broken but his body was severely cut and

bruised. The fire was not extinguished till Sunday forenoon. The building belonged to Mr. Fordham who will lose heavily by the destruction of a large stock of leather stored in the cellar.

Two families occupied the rooms over Mr. Fordham's store, named Purcell and Mulcahy. The escape of these was cut off by the stairs being burnt. though under medical treatment during One of the women was lowered by a that time. rope, and others by a ladder. They lost everything.
