lutely necessary for the army in Turkey to return by sea and not through Roumania.

A Vienna special says all offices in Bulgaria are being filled by Russians or Bulgarians, educated in Russia. In the formation of 70 battalions and 12 squadrons of Bulgarian militia, it is ordered that the officers be Bulgarians.

A special to the Standard from Vienna says that negotiations are proceeding between Russia and Servia, the object of which is to allow Russia to occupy Belgrade if a conflict with Austria should become inevitable.

Russian officers and soldiers are forbidden, under penalty of death, to enter Constantinople without a special permission from the Russian headquarters. The barracks just outside of Constantinople are being prepared for Russian sick, who can find no other cover.

GREECE.—The inhabitants of Modut Olympus have risen and declared for union with Greece. Five hundred and fifty volunteers from Greece have joined them, with two steamer cargoes of rifles.

The Greeks have based great hopes on the insurrection in Thessaly, Epirus and Crete. The Turkish troops are retreating before the insurgents.

ing the spectators on the way. The Government warned the Vatican authorities that they could take no measures to prevent possible disturbance at the Pope's coronation, as the Pope did not recognize the King of Italy. The Vatican, therefore, decided that the coronation should be strictly private.

It is said that the Pope intends to dismiss Pontifical gendarmes and Swiss guards; he will probably reside mostly at Castel Gandolfo, 14 miles southeast of Rome, in order to be away from the Italian Government.
