The Starr Manufacturing Company offer to hire an engine and boiler to work the Dartmouth Town's stone crusher, at \$50 per annum.



The terrible slave trade which existed in parts of Africa a few years since seems to have pretty nearly passed away :--

In a letter on the subject of African exploration, and the influence for good exerted by the missionaries and by the officials to whom the British Government has committed the task of representing her determination to stop the slavers' crimes, the Rev. Horace Waller tells us that less than ten years ago it was computed that nearly 50,000 slaves per annum were exported from East Africa to Zanzibar, Pemba, Madagascar, the Comoros, Persia, Arabia, the Red Seaand Egypt. This represents a loss of life in the interior of Africa of half a mil, lion people annually. The Island of Pemba was the last spot to try the vigilance of our consuls, but it is now said : -" The slave trade is at an end; still how long will this good news continue? Not a slave goes to Pemba now, nor has one gone for a good while ; it looks as if the thing were to be wound up at last."
