ARTIFICIAL MANURES .- Do not phosphates and other artificial manures exhaust the land more rapidly than barnyard manure and the old way of farming, that, is, according to the crops you raise? In certain instances phosphates or any other artificial manure would hasten the exhaustion of land. If phosphates only were applied increased vigour would be given to the plants, which would take up the nitrogen and potash in the soil all the more rapidly. So if potash only, or nitrates only were put on, each would tend to the more

rapid exhaustion of the other constituent, and both, would hasten the exhaustion of the phosphates. Barnyard manure returns to the soil a plentiful supply of nitrogen and potash, but it is usually deficient in phosphates. Barnyard manure and phosphates together therefore make a good manure.-Globe

DEPTH TO SOW SEEDS .- Seeds often get washed bare by the watering pot; hence the old plan of covering the surface of the soil with a thin layer of moss to break the force of the water, and which is a good plan with fine seeds. All small seeds should be sown on a perfectly even and level surface, and covered with two or three times their own thickness of fine soil; and they should be watered carefully with the finest rose. Almost all flowering anan inch deep, and some, those of the larger, may be covered a little deeper unless the soil is heavy and tenacious. Of kitchen garden crops, beans should be sown about four inches deep, peas not less than th ee inches, seakale two inches, asparagus one inch, cabbage, | ingly. cauliflower, and turnip about half an inch, carrot and onions half an inch, kidney beans two inches, and all small seeds like lettuce about a quarter of an inch deep .- London Field. -


