GERMANY. - While the Emperor was taking a drive on Sunday afternoon, some shots, proceeding from a house in avenue Unter Den Linden, were fired at him. The Emperor was wounded in one arm and on one cheek by luck and on a state of the line was with the line of the line o small shots. The would-be assassin is Dr. Noblins, occupying apartments at No. 18 Unter Den Linden. When his door was forced open he fired upon and wounded the hotel keeper and tried to commit suicide, but was secured. The several grains of shot were extracted, causing great loss of blood. The Emperor suffered great pain, but never lost consciousness. No serious apprehensions are felt.

The Daily Telegraph's Vienna correspondent remarks that but for Bismarck Congress might at one time have been convened without England, which would have been worse than no Congress at all. Germany, by issuing invitations, becomes guarantee that the whole treaty will be submitted to discussion.

SERVIA .- A disturbance occurred on Monday last in Belgrade. The crowd pelted Prince Milan's palace.

ITALY .- A despatch from Rome to the Pall Mall Gazette says the Pope is ill in body and distressed in mind by plots and cabals designed to prevent the reforms he proposes. It is reported that the Pope manifests a disposition to abdicate.

SPAIN .- In the Cortes at Madrid, on Monday, the President explained his conduct in summarily terminating assortments of Staple and Fancy Saturday's session before the opposition could be heard. Members of the opposition thereupon agreed to resume their seats and the debate on the Bar celona agitation was continued.




