Todd's notice, I would respectfully inform all who purpose to attend the Convention and who require travelling facilities from this city to Fredericton, that the Superintendent of the E. & N. A. R. R., has kindly authorized me to grant certificates to delegates and visitors, which, on presentation at the Ticket offices in St. John or Carleton, will entitle them to receive a ticket to and from Fredericton at one fare, \$2.00.

The date of issue will be from August 22nd, to 27th, and good for return up to and the 29th inclusive. Any persons desiring to avail themselves of the above offer are requested to notify me on or before the 21st inst., so that I may prepare certificates for them, and file them at the Ticket office.

I would also proffer the following items of information, which may be of value to delegates from Nova Scotia. Messrs. Small & Hatheway will allow any delegates or Visitors journeying on their Bay of Fundy Steamers, and who pay full fare to St. John, a return passage free, on their presenting a certificate of attendance from the Secretary of the Convention.

The fare from Annapolis to St. John is \$2.00; from Digby \$1.50, and the Steamers leave Annapolis for this city on Tuesdays, Thursdays and Saturdays arriving here at about 8 p. m.

A Day Steamer leaves for Fredericton at 9 a. m., on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays, arriving in Fredericton at about 4 o'clock, and returns on alternate days arriving in St. John about 2 o'clock.

Local News.

THE GRANVILLE STREET BAPTIST SABBATH SCHOOL had a splendid day for their annual Picnic excursion yesterday on McNabs' Island. The Steamer A. C. Whitney started at 10 a. m., with a fine cargo of young people, with their means of amusement and provisions for the day.

In the afternoon again, at 2 o'clock they were joined by friends who were unable to leave the city in the morning. We go to press before they return, but presume it was a very pleasant and healthful occasion.

A valuable cogowas cleared from this port on Wednesday last for London on board the barque Ocean Express, Capt. S. W. Crosby. It consisted of 19,373 cases of preserved lobsters, salmon and mackerel, 78 casks of seal skins, 71 casks of cod oil, two casks of furs, and sundry small lots of merchandise, making a total value of \$121,185.

The different companies of circus and theatrical performers contributed \$136 to the City Treasury last month for licenses.

A number of Philadelphia Firmen have been on a visit to Halifax during the past week, and have been well entertained by the Fire Companies of our city. As it happened there were two quite serious fires during their visit. They were present and did good service. Previous to their departure they presented a highly complimentary address expressing the pleasure they had felt during their stay in our "beautiful city."

Good reports are brought from the Labrador fishing grounds. The Rover's Bride arrived on Wednesday with 700 qtls of codfish.

A deputation of the Dartmouth Town Council attended a meeting of the Halifax City Council on Wednesday last and submitted the following questions:

1st. Will the city act in conjunction with Dartmouth in the establishment of a ferry.

2nd. If the city do not act with the town of Dartmouth, and the ferry be established by Dartmouth alone, will the city cede the town the ferry property belonging to the city?

3rd. In the event of such a ferry being established would the city grant a free supply of water for the use of the boats?

At the same meeting the matter of repairing the walls of the Grand Parade in front of Dalhousie College was reported on by the Recorder, recommending that estimates of the cost be procured, the expense being borne by either or both parties—the city and College Governors—without any admissions of right being made. The report was referred to the Board of Works to report on.

On Friday last a large fire for Halifax occurred on the corner of Agricola and Garrick Streets. Two houses were destroyed.

A man—names Thomas Neville, an employee on the I. C. Railway was knocked down by a train on Wednesday last near Windsor Junction and much injured.

A large fire occurred at Turtle Cove, Dartmouth, on Tuesday night last on premises of S. Oland & Sons. Their brewery and outhouses, and a dwelling house adjoining, occupied by the family of the proprietors, were all destroyed. The Dartmouth Fire Engine Company were on hand as soon as possible, but the fire had made so much headway as to be beyond their control for some time.

There were \$15,000 insurance on the brewery and 1,500 on the furniture.
