I will endeavor before the election to personally discuss the issues of the contest with as many of you as is possible. Meanwhile, I venture to hope that the views I have here expressed are such as will commend themselves to your judgment, and justify me in expecting your confidence and support.

The Story of the Bible Lesson.

FOR THE PRIMARY CLASS. Return of the Seventy.
