

LUNenburg.—A new brig named the Emma, owned by Messrs. Eisenhauer & Co., left here on Saturday, at 5 p. m., for the West Indies, commanded by Capt. George Selig. She was run into about fifty miles off this port by the steamer Worcester, from Halifax bound to Boston. The steamer struck her on the port quarter, carrying away wheel gear and mastsail, and doing other damage to her hull.

H. M. S. Bellerophon (flag-ship), accompanied by H. M. S. Sirius, sailed on Saturday for Newport, R. I. After returning here the Bellerophon will proceed to Quebec, to be present at the reception of the Marquis of Lorne and Princess Louise.

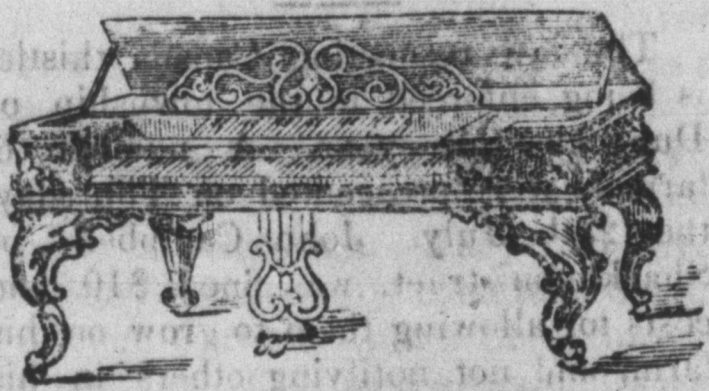

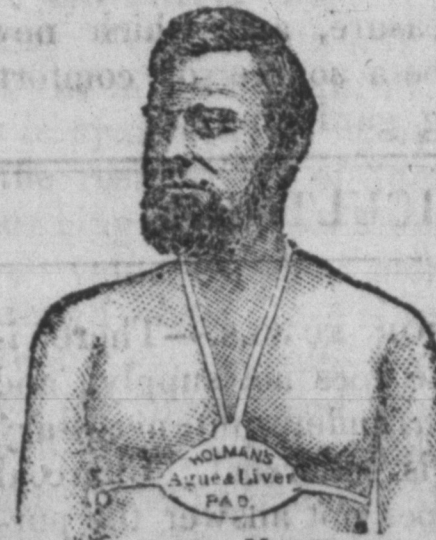
