A CONTEST

of any description has attractions for certain parties. A pugilistic encounter, or a dog-fight will at all times draw together a crowd of boys. When it becomes a horse-race or a boating affair, that comes across our path, it requires a very stolid nature or an attitude of some firmness to resist the temptation to become an interested spectator. The gladiatorial shows of ancient Rome and the races of the Grecian athletes were developments of this feature of human nature, and were encouraged by the rulers and the thousands who went out to witness them.

In these days we have encounters which command universal attention, but somewhat different in their character. Politics is the field of operation. Two great parties are contending for popular favor entrusting them with the reins of government of this Dominion of ours. They have adopted the names respectivel Reformers and Liberal Conservatives. The former we presume means that they will reform what they believe is wrong, and the latter that they will secure as much as possible of liberty to the people, and at the same time conserve what is good in the state. A distinction without a great deal of difference. The party with the former appellation being in power are striving to keep; in whilst the party with the latter designation are seeking an increase of strength, that they may be able to replace them in the administration of public affairs.

Stringent guards and checks have been found necessary to prevent corruption, and misuse of the public funds. Wholesome legislation has been effected providing that no legislator shall be allowed to make any contract with the government. This enactment has rendered it necessary that a new election shall take place in Halifax and Digby Counties, seeing that the sitting members were shareholders in the Halifax Citizen Publishing Company, and had such contracts with the government for printing.

The nomination of Candidates for Halifax will take place to-morrow Thursday. In anticipation of this public meetings have been held in Temperance Hall. On Wednesday last Hon. Dr. Tupper addressed a crowded audience there for about two hours. He had a most enthusiastic reception.

On Thursday evening the rival candidates A. G. Jones, Esq., and W. H. Richey, Esq. met there by appointment. Each was allowed to speak one hour first, and than half an hour each afterwards. The Hall was of course crowded to its utmost capacity. Each of the contestants strove to shew what extravagance, and incompetency had marked the course of the party to which they were opposed, and that they were therefore unworthy of public confidence. W. C. Silver, Esq., filled the chair and was surrounded by leading gentlemen on either side.

The polling will take place on Thursday of next week. The secular papers are full of these matters and it would appear that both sides are confident of winning.

Cur readers know pretty well for whom to vote; and need no instruction from us as to the merits of the two parties. There should be no shirking of responsibility. Every voter should come up to the poll and deposit his vote, and thus make his influence felt in the councils of his country.
