

On Monday last a man somewhat new at the business, was working at the screw pressing dried fish in a store on Mr. A. H. Crowe's (Fisherman's) wharf, when the handles of the screw, in returning, struck him a violent blow on the forehead, knocking him senseless to the floor, and injuring him somewhat severely.

A young man, named Alexander McDonald, belonging to Sherbrooke, Guysboro' Co., resident in Yarmouth for some time, on Friday last, while removing his revolver from the table, accidentally discharged it, the ball entering the fleshy part of the arm below the elbow.

The Port Hawkesbury News of the week says scarlet fever has been prevalent at Port Hood for some weeks past. Several children have died, and the public schools have been closed for fear of contagion.

The public schools have been closed in Pugwash on account of the prevalence of Diphtheria. The disease is proving very fatal at Sackville, N. B., especially among children. At Point deBute, a young physician named McBride died of the disease after a few days illness.

Thomas Roach 20 years of age, son of Mr. W. H. Roach, of Annapolis while engaged attending the haul-up in Delap's steam mill, at 2 o'clock to day, and endeavouring to free the chain, was caught by the hand, drawing him three times round the barrel of the shaft, a coil of the chain passing round his body at each turn, causing instant death.

There was a large political gathering at Pictou on Tuesday of last week. The Hon. James McDonald and Rupert Doull were nominated for the Dominion Parliament, and Messrs. S. H. Holmes, H. J. Cameron and Alexander McKay for the Local.

Doctor Tupper arrived at Pictou at ten, and was escorted around the town by a torchlight procession and two bands of music. He spoke for about three quarters of an hour from the carriage.

DIED FROM INJURIES.—A few days ago a little daughter of the Drum-major of the 97th regiment was playing on the verandah at its father's quarters, when she fell off to the ground below. The injuries she received were of so serious a nature that medical assistance proved of no avail and she died on Saturday morning.

STEALING PIPE. On Saturday afternoon it was noticed that the door of a vacant house, owned by Mr. Patrick Moran, on Sarah and Agricola streets, was open. Further investigation showed that some one had effected an entrance through a cellar window, and cut and carried off the gas and water pipe all over the house.

DRUGGED AND ROBBED.—A Nova Scotian named John Murphy, about thirty years of age, who was about to leave St. John on Wednesday by the American steamer, was enticed into a liquor store by two men, drugged and robbed of \$50 and his watch. Two men have been arrested on suspicion of being the guilty parties.

DARTMOUTH STEAM FIRE ENGINE.—The new Steam Fire Engine, the "Lady Dufferin," purchased by the Dartmouth Town Council from Messrs. Silby, of Seneca Falls, N. Y., is expected to arrive in the steamer from New York to-day. It is said to be a very handsome and efficient machine.

FLOWER AND POULTRY SHOW.—Prize lists for the Flower and Poultry Show, during the first week in September, are now ready and may be obtained from the committee, and at A. & W. McKinlay's, Granville street, Geo. Piers', steamboat wharf, and J. W. Betcher's, Cornwallis Street.

FIRE IN DARTMOUTH.—On Saturday morning at 4 o'clock an alarm of fire was sounded. The Fire and Protection companies turned out and found the alarm came from a house owned and occupied by Richard Innis, on a cross street near the cove. The fire had evidently been burning for some time, and the wood work around the chimney in the kitchen was a good deal charred and burnt. The Protection Company removed the furniture but the fire was extinguished with a few buckets of water. The furniture was put back in the house and the firemen left. About 9 o'clock another alarm was sounded, which was found to proceed from the same house. The fire had not been effectually extinguished and had broken out again between the walls in the room above. The walls had to be torn down and the house almost gutted before the fire could be finely extinguished.—Chronicle.

BURGLARY.—Some time between Friday night and Saturday morning the house of Mr. William Chisholm, of Pleasant Street, was entered through a basement window and the house ransacked from top to bottom. Locks were broken, trunks and drawers opened and a quantity of property stolen. Mr. Chisholm and his family were out of town for a few days and the house was closed up. The robbery was discovered on Saturday and reported to the City Marshal, who detailed Sgt. Power to investigate the matter. Two hours after the case was placed in his hands the Sergeant arrested a youth named James Coy on suspicion of being the thief, and found several articles of the stolen property in his possession.

PORT WARDEN'S SURVEY.—The Port Warden held a survey on Saturday on the Norwegian barque Friis, which put into this port dismasted on Tuesday night, on the voyage from New York to Copenhagen, as before reported. She was ordered to discharge the cargo in the forward hold to get the broken foremast out, and some from the hold aft to trim the vessel. The discharging and repairing commenced on Saturday.

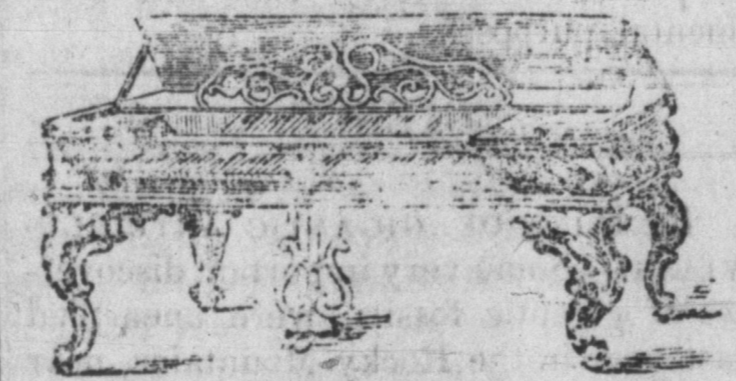

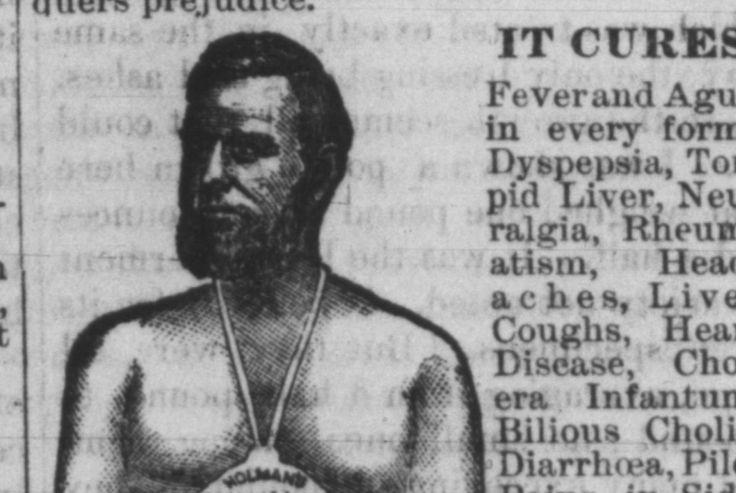
