The best of our American exchanges make no hesitation in expressing their opinion that the Decision of the Fisheries Commission should be paid. Here is what the Watchman says on the subject:—

THE FISHERIES AWARD. A good deal of national self-complacency was fostered in connection with the treaty for the arbitration of the Alabama Claims. The success of the measure, for which we took a full share of credit to ourselves, it was assumed, would be a powerful argument and an influential precedent in favor of arbitration as a substitute for war.

We are in danger of intensifying this feeling by quibbling against the Fisheries Award. By the terms of the treaty, the question whether anything is due from us to Great Britain in consideration of privileges enjoyed by our fishermen, was to be left to three commissioners, one appointed by each government, with a third named from another nation.

The Mansion on the North West Arm, owned and occupied by Mr. Edward Albro has been offered to the Presbyterians for their College at about one quarter of its original cost.

THE WEATHER.—We are told that mild winters are usually followed by cool summers. There was a remarkable instance of this in the early part of the current century. In the year 1816—which is remembered in New England as "the year without summer" is stated that frost, ice and snow were common in June; and in August ice half an inch thick was formed.

Our meteorologist Mr. F. Allison, says: "We may expect April to be colder in its season, than March, and the wet weather to continue until after the middle, returning again at the close. The third week should be the fairest, but the month generally windy and disagreeable, with little progress towards Spring."

Dartmouth had a large fire on Tuesday evening. The old grist mill in the Cove, which has for some time past been unused was found to be on fire. It was a very large building four stories in height. It caused quite an alarm in the city—many supposing that the larger part of the town was in flames. It was partially insured and must have been set on fire by an incendiary. The Town Council offer a reward of \$100 for the discovery of the guilty party.

For many years we have not known apples to be so scarce in our markets as they are present. The Winter was an unfavorable one for the preservation of the fruit, but the shipments abroad have taken away the greater portion of the crop. Kings and Annapolis Counties will do well to take the hint.

The projector of the Cole Harbor Dyke is endeavoring to induce the Cornwallis people to construct a dyke from Kingsport to Long Island.

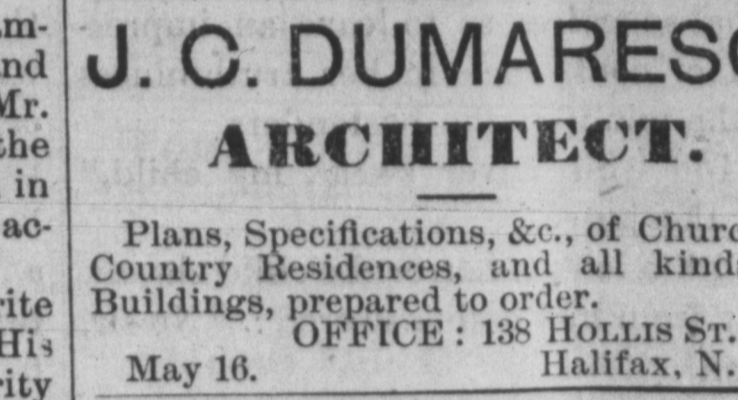
